PRIZES FOR GUESSING AT THE POULTRY SHOW

Pair of Plymouth Rocks to Person Estimating Gate Receipts First Day.

MONEY PREMIUMS ALSO

Silver Cup Offered for Owner of Best Parti-Colored Bird.

Are you good at guessing? Well, at the Boone County Poultry Show to be held in Columbia January 10-13, you may win a prize each day of the show. The first day a pair of Plymouth Rock chickens will be given by George E. Thomas to the person guessing nearest the gate receipts for that day. A pair of Brown Leghorns will be given by J. E. Bedford to the one guessing nearest the gate receipts for the second day.

J. M. Stone offers a turkey gobbler and Miss E. N. Hodge a pair of Single Comb Rhode Island Reds to the persons guessing the receipts of the third and fourth days. J. E. Meteer also offers a pair of Mallard ducks to the one guessing nearest the number of grains of corn in a quart glass.

In addition to the regular premiums of ribbons and money prizes given by the Boone County Poultry Association, seven silver cups are offered. T. E. Quisenberry, secretary of the Missouri State Poultry Association, offers a silver cup for the highest scoring parti-colored bird shown by Boone county exhibitors. Twelve competitors are required. The Useful Poultry Journal offers a cup for the highest scoring solid colored bird shown by Boone county exhibitors.

The Boone County Poultry Association will give a silver cup for the highest scoring pen. F. A. Henninger offers a cup for the best pen of Brown Leghorns. The Columbia Commercial Club offers a cup for the best display of twelve solid or parti-colored birds shown by a Boone county exhibitor. The Missouri State Poultry Association offers to its members two cups, one for the best display of any one variety and another for the highest scoring pen. The Boone County Court also offers to Boone county exhibitors thirty dollars in prizes.

A poultry institute will be held in Columbia while the show is in progress. Experienced breeders will lecture to the farmers and poultrymen on practical questions relating to feeding, incubating, brooding and judging poultry. E. C. Branch will be the judge of the show. Miss Elizabeth Hodge, assistant secretary of the Boone County Poultry Association said, "We expect at least a thousand birds."

NEW GENERATOR FOR M. U.

New Piece of Machinery for Light Plant Weighs Eighteen Tons.

G. D. Crist, a contractor, asked the permission of the City Council at its meeting last Monday night, to move an electric generator weighing eighteen tons from the Missouri, Kansas and Texas tracks to the University, and asked to use the road engine owned by the city. He said he wished to pull the machinery on Eighth street. A motion was made and carried requiring him to give \$1,000 bond to insure the city against any damage that might be done to the streets. The generator is to replace the old one at the University power plant.

INDOOR RIFLE SQUAD SELECTED

Shoot With University of Iowa Will Take Place Next Week.

A squad from which the rifle team which is to compete against the team from the University of Iowa is to be chosen, has been selected and the match is to be held soon. The date for the shoot is Wednesday, January 14, which means that the firing must be done Saturday or else Monday or Tuesday of the coming week. Each team shoots at home and the scores are compared.

One condition of the match is that all shooting must be done by artificial light. As the Missouri team wishes all the practice it can get, the shooting here probably will not be done until Monday and Tuesday nights next week. The squad has been narrowed down to about twenty men, ten of whom will be the regular team, and the other ten will be alternates.

From now until the match is shot off, almost all the shooting done in the gallery will be done by the members of this rifle squad, but later every man in the corps will be allowed to shoot. This system has developed several good shots this year, and some new men may get a chance in some of the later matches.

The match for January 21 is with the Rhode Island Agricultural college, and for January 28 with the University of California. This first shoot with Iowa is regarded as one of the hardest on the schedule, as the Iowa team is considered very strong.


