## "PLAY BALL!" FIRST GAME NEXT WEEK

Tigers Getting Ready to Meet Missouri Valley College April 1.

### SQUAD NOW HAS 26 MEN

### Ineligibles May Play Varsity Some Time Before Regular Game.

With the first baseball game of the season only a few days off, the Tigers are working hard to improve their form. The Missouri Valley College team will open the season here April 1.

Several good catches by Hall of long flies after hard runs brought the first clapping that has been heard on Rollins Field since last fall.

Yesterday the squad was cut to twenty-six men. Twelve players who have made poor showings were dropped. The remainder will be carried although many of them may never get in a game. Since the first practice was called about fifty candidates have tried for the various positions.

The team will be strong in the battery. With Castillo, Hogan, and Riley catching and Harper, Ellis and Helmerich pitching, Missouri will be a match for most college teams in this department. Castillo, catcher on last year's freshman team is considered by C. L. Brewer to be one of the best for this position. Hogan was doing good work until he sprained an ankle last week in practice and has not been able to play till yesterday.

Missouri is well supplied with good pitchers. Harper was considered by competent authorities to be the best college pitcher in the conference last year. He did not strike his best condition until the schedule was half over but he is doing as well now as at any time last season. Ellis, the best of the freshmen pitchers last season, is pitching fine ball now. Few hits are being made from his delivery by the candidates. Helmerich and Duvall are the other two pitchers that will strengthen the staff.

The first base position is being fought for by Hackney, Miller, and Kirchival. So far it has been hard for the coach to decide which is the best. Second base and shortstop will be played by O'Byrn and Besheer. These are old men and are relied on to be the main strength in the infield. Hornbeck will be the third baseman. In the outfield Hall, centerfielder on last year's championship team, is sure of his position. The other two outfielders will be selected wholly upon their ability to hit, as most of the candidates are good fielders.

The players in the University who are ineligible to try for the team will play a game with the Varsity some time before the game with Missouri Valley College a week from Saturday.

Missouri Valley College has practically the same team that won from Missouri last spring. They expect to win again but Professor Brewer is optimistic about the chances of the Tigers.

### MOTORISTS MUST BE CAREFUL

After August, Pedestrians Will Have Preference on State Highways.

Under the Hull Motor Car Bill passed by the last General Assembly, effective August 1 of this year, pedestrians and horse drivers are given preference over motor car drivers in the use of state highways. The new law declares that before passing a pedestrian or vehicle on a state highway, the motorist must give a clear signal.

The law further states that cars must be equipped with proper breaks and must display two lights, in front and two in the rear of the car. These lights must be burning from thirty minutes after sunset to thirty minutes before sunrise. At a crossing the motorist is required to slow down and to sound his horn.

Besides making an owner responsible for damage to life and property in the same degree as a railroad, the law also raises the state license for motor cars and authorized cities to do the same. Cities, however, cannot charge more than the state. No person under 18 years old may obtain a license to operate a car.

For enforcement of the new law, the Secretary of State is allowed an automobile license clerk at a salary of \$1,500 a year. A state license inspector is also provided for. His duty shall be to travel over the state to catch owners who have neglected to register. He is to be paid \$2,000 a year. The money left from license fees after paying these officials is to go into the state road fund.

## WILL ASK ASHLAND FOR FUNDS.

### Commercial Club Committee Will Talk About Electric Road.

The people of Ashland will be told tomorrow afternoon about the North Missouri Central by the members of the Columbia Commercial Club committee who went to St. Louis recently. A full report will be made of the present condition of the electric railroad company and of its apparent ability to construct the road from Columbia to Jefferson City through Ashland as soon as the bonus is assured.

The advantages of such a line will be pointed out and an attempt will be made to raise part of the \$20,000 of the bonus yet to be pledged. The committee is composed of W. T. Anderson, S. C. Hunt, M. G. Quinn and F. W. Niedermeyer.

### SAYS STRIKE WILL SOON END.

George B. Dorsey Formerly Had an Interest in Benld, Ill., Mines.

The coal miners' strike which started at Benld, Ill., about a week ago, and on account of which 300 militiamen have been sent to that town, will be settled in a day or two, according to George B. Dorsey who also owns coal mines in that region. In 1903 Mr. Dorsey and his brother, H. B. Dorsey, sold 47,000 acres of coal lands to the Superior Mining Company, whose men are now striking for better wages and better working conditions.

"The strikers at Benld have been denied the support of the state organization of union miners," said Mr. Dorsey this morning. "They will have to return to work soon, or the company will employ other union men."

Mr. Dorsey and his brother now own mines at Hillsboro, Ill., about twenty miles from the scene of the strike. There is no disturbance at their mines.
