HARD WORK WINS, DEAN SAYS

Dr. Jackson Tells Medical Society of Successful Traits.

When Dr. C. M. Jackson, dean of the School of Medicine, talked to the Medical Society Friday night on "Some Factors Underlying Success in Medicine," he made rightly directed work one of the most important factors.

"Hard work directed in the right way will always bring good results," he said. "Concentrate your efforts on the things you are doing. Do not work in a mechanical way. When you are in the laboratory think what you are about. To perform an experiment one can not be talking about what the football team is doing or about the moving picture show they had last night and get the best results."

Dr. Jackson ranked "don't worry" as the second factor underlying the success of a doctor. "Do not worry means a conservation of energy" he said. "Do your best and then do not worry over the result. This is the way to look at an examination. Al-

ways prepare fully for it and when you know you have done your best don't worry over the result. Equanimity is a valuable asset to doctor's success in practice. To get rattled is an unfortunate thing for a doctor when a difficult moment arises." Dean Jackson closed his talk by reciting Kipling's poem "If."

M. M. Miller talked on "Success Made By Graduates of The School of Medicine. He said that in the last four years forty men have gone from this medical school to other schools. Of this number Washington University gets the most; Rush the next and then St. Louis University and Johns Hopkins. "The success of the students who have gone out from our school has been remarkable," he said. "It can not be compared with that of other schools."

Mr. Miller cited many of the old men who had made good. Some were in the Philippine Islands, some in Panama, some in Missouri and many in eastern schools.

After the talks the members of the Medical Society served ginger cakes and cider.
