MISSOURI MEDICS WIDELY SCATTERED

Several Graduates Here Go to Panama and Philippine Islands.

MANY STUDY IN ST. LOUIS

Washington U. and St. Louis U. Are Popular For the Last Years of Course.

Of the graduates of the School of Medicine of the University of Missouri, several are in the government medical service in the island possessions of the United States, others are practicing in this country and a number are still studying in other medical schools, according to M. M. Miller, a graduate of the school.

W. G. Weese, who was graduated at Johns Hopkins after leaving here, is in the government medical service in Panama.

Ruskin Libanon is professor of anatomy in the Medical School of Manila.

J. R. ("Peaches") Pinion is in the government employ in the Philippine Islands.

C. H. Hecker, who went from here to Washington University, is now interne in the Children's Hospital in St. Louis.

R. B. Hill, who after graduating here was interne for a year in Parker Memorial Hospital, is now pathologist in Ancon Hospital in Panama.

F. P. Johnson after graduation was assistant in anatomy at the University of Missouri and is now instructor in histology and embryology at Harvard.

W. A. Smith went from here to Washington University and is now in the St. Luke's and Children's Hospital in St. Louis.

Two Go to Bellevue.

W. E. Mains is assistant physiologist at Bellevue Hospital, New York. Ephraim Ewing is instructor in physiology in Bellevue.

E. L. Miller, a former football captain here, was graduated at Harvard after leaving here, and is now practicing in Kansas City.

WOMEN TO PLAY OUT OF DOORS

"Work Will Be Healthier" Says Their Athletic Director.

The University women's interclass basketball games will be played outdoors next spring, according to present plans. The hockey field south of Read Hall will be cut up into four basketball courts, so that the women can take their athletic work outdoors in good weather.

"The work will be healthier outdoors," said Miss Margaret Austill, director of the Women's gymnasium yesterday. "We won't have to use Rothwell Gymnasium any more for our interclass games. Another advantage is that more girls can play and I can watch them better to see that they do not overdo it. There is danger that when a girl is trying for a team she may work too hard. But if all the girls are given a chance to play more, whether they are trying for a team or not, I think that this danger will be lessened.

"Class numerals will be given not so much for ability in any one branch of athletics but for efficiency in all of them. This will prevent specialization and will cause a well rounded athletic development."

With the commencement of outdoor basketball Miss Austill expects the girls to show an added interest in physical training.

"Nebraska beat us because they had a heavier team and better players; our men were poor on tackling; the line held poorly, the backfield was slow in getting started and the wore us out. The Tigers seemed to blow up in the last two quarters; no, they didn't lay down—I don't think any of our men will do that. But they lost some of the ginger that was in them at first. Nebraska is four or five touchdowns better than we are any day in the week."

The man who takes defeat in that manner is a credit to himself, to any team, and any college. He is a true type of the college athlete — Daily Nebraskan.

SOIL SURVEY BULLETINS OUT

Work in Charge of C. F. Marbut of Geology Department.

Two new bulletins showing the result of the soil surveys of Audrain and Sullivan counties have been issued by the Missouri Agricultural Experiment Station. The special feature of the bulletins are the large maps in colors indicating the physical features of the counties and the soil types in the different sections.

The soil surveys are made by the United States Department of Agriculture in connection with the Missouri Experiment Station. The work is in charge of C. F. Marbut of the geology department of the University of Missouri. Mr. Marbut was granted a leave of absence last year to be in this work and has had his leave extended this year. Up to this time soil survey of twenty counties have been made, and a survey is now being made in Laclede County. The plan of the survey is to gather all of the agricultural facts about the soil types of the county and to obtain the general soil types of the different sections of the state.

Curtis Hill, State Highway Engineer will go to Warsaw November 15 to attend a convention of representatives from the county courts, county highway engineers, good roads associations and commercial associations in the town between Sedalia and Springfield.
