which the College of Agriculture is doing to make it the "best Missouri." S. M. Jordan, called the "lantern-jawed corn man" by one South Missouri farmer whom he showed how to raise thirty bushels of corn instead of fifteen, told of the work of taking the University to the people by means of lectures.

The dining hall was decorated in Japanese lanterns, parasols and fans. Between the posts were strung seven lanterns with a parasol hung from the center one. Around the chandelier in the center of the room, parasols were arranged to shade the light. The posts were wound with black bunting, imitating the old gold and black. The decorating was done by H. F. Major, superintendent of University grounds.

REPORTS ON EXTENSION WORK

N. T. Gentry Tells What the Society Has Accomplished.

N. T. Gentry, chairman of the executive committee of the School Extension Society of Columbia, makes

the following report of the work of the society since its organization, October 9, 1911:

The management of the practical work undertaken by this society has been delegated to an executive committee of fifteen members whose names are: N. T. Gentry, Mrs. Woodson Moss, Mrs. George Shepherd, the Rev. C. M. Aker, F. W. Niedermeyer, Dean W. W. Carters, Prof. W. H. Hays, George Hackley, Mayor W. S. St. Clair, Miss Fanny Nowell, E. W. Kellogg, J. S. Mountjoy and W. T. Cross. This committee has held regular monthly meetings since its organization. The practical management of the society's work has been further detailed to the standing committees, on activities, membership, publicity, entertainment and finance.

As indicated in the constitution of this organization, "This School Extension Society exists for the purpose of extending as widely as possible the benefits of education, of enriching and completing the lives of all members of the community, and of developing an intelligent and progressive citizenship." Through the co-operation of the Board of Educa-

tion the high school building has been regularly in use Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings. The gymnasium of Christian College is regularly used on Tuesday and Thursday evenings for women's classes and the Gordon Hotel Building, with the equipment of the home economics department, is used one afternoon and one evening every week. The plan of activities regularly carried on during the four days indicated is as follows (the fact being indicated when classes meet on other days):

Library and reading room, at the High School Building, open every afternoon after 4:30 and every evening from 7 to 9 o'clock. A good circulating library is in use, a number of popular magazines are kept and the society is receiving regularly copies of daily newspapers of Columbia, St. Louis, Kansas City, St. Joseph and other cities. It is felt that already a distinct service has been rendered Columbia through the development of a reading public.
