K. C. SCHOOLS WILL BE URGED TO ENTER

C. L. Brewer to Try to Get Teams Entered in High School Meet.

NO EVENTS IN MORNING

School Board Rule Prevents St. Louis Teams Leaving the City.

Prof. C. L. Brewer will leave for Kansas City, where he will make an effort to get the Kansas high school to send track teams to the annual High School Day meet on Rollins Field May 4. It is certain that the St. Louis schools cannot compete because of a school board rule which prohibits any high school team leaving the city for an athletic contest, but Mr. Brewer thinks there is no reason why the Kansas City high schools should not be represented.

The first entry in the track meet was from Breckenridge High School. "Indications point to a bigger meet than ever" said Mr. Brewer today. "Several entries have come in so far and a number of new schools have promised to enter the meet."

Reduced Rates on Railroad.

Special efforts will be made this year to get visitors to come here and see the University as well as to participate in the athletic contests and debate. All railroads are offering reduced fares for the day. As usual, the contestants will be entertained by the fraternities and clubs. The Ad Club also has appointed a reception committee to meet the trains take the visitors to their quarters and generally be of service.

There will be no preliminaries for the track meet in the morning, as was previously announced. The events will all be in the afternoon. The track meet will start at 2 o'clock. Entries will close next Monday.

The Debate will be held in the Auditorium Saturday night.

President Hill to Hold Conference.

Several teachers' conferences will be held Saturday. For the first time in Columbia, the city superintendents will hold a "Round Table." President A. Ross Hill has planned a general conference for all the teachers in accredited schools and in the University. There will also be several sectional meetings, and, as usual, there will be a complimentary luncheon Saturday noon for all visiting teachers. All divisions of the University are being urged to keep "open house" Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. Saturday morning some have promised to give exhibitions.

Miss Mary B. Breed adviser of University women, will give a reception at 5:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon for all visiting women. The University Cadet Band will give a concert on the quadrangle from 6:30 to 7:30 Saturday night. The debating and essay contests will close the day in the Auditorium Saturday night.
