FOOD FOR 900 A DAY THERE
Crowds at the Cafeteria in U. D. Club Exceeded Expectations.
The new cafeteria of the University Dining Club has been providing meals for approximately 900 persons a day. The popularity of the quick meal has exceeded expectations.
The cafeteria is capable of accommodating about 300 persons at each meal. The largest run has been during luncheon. The price of the average meal served has been fifteen cents. The manager, Stanley Sisson, says that more persons were served last night at the club than at any time last year, except during the "short horn" season. The cafeteria will continue as a permanent feature of the club.
More than 300 students have signed tickets for the year at the club. This number was served last night at the tables upstairs notwithstanding this there were more than 250 who ate at the cafeteria. The food is of the best quality and is prepared in excellent style. Among the items of the bill-of-fare are: eggs on toast, three cents; bacon, three cents; roast beef, six cents; vegetables such as beans, cabbage and tomatoes, two cents.
The "hit" of the season the cold sliced watermelon, two large slices of which are served for four cents.—News item from yesterday's Missourian.
