Defeated Wisconsin 19 to 0, in Thrilling Open Field Playing.

By United Press. CHICAGO, Nov. 22. — Chicago clinched the claim to the Western Conference title yesterday afternoon by defeating Wisconsin in a game of thrilling open field playing. The score was 19 to 0. Wisconsin was last year's champion. For three periods Stagg's men out-classed the Badgers at every angle. But in the final period Wisconsin brought the ball from the middle of the field twice to Chicago's 3-yard line and lost it on fumbles. They were advancing the third time when time was called. Over 30,000 spectators saw the game.

HARVARD DEFEATS YALE

Brickley Kicks Five Field Goals Before Crowd of 48,000.

By United Press. CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 22.—Before 48,000 persons, the largest crowd ever assembled to watch a football game in the United States, Charles Brickley, full back for Harvard, kicked five field goals and brought defeat to Yale, 15 to 5. Yale fought gamely.

Brickley tried seven field goals and missed two. Four of the successful kicks were drop-kicks, one from placement. Guernsey scored Yale's lone goal with a drop-kick from the 38-yard line in the second period. The other Yale score was made on a fluke play by O'Brien around Harvard's end in first period when kick-off struck goal posts and he touched the ball behind his own goal line, making a safety.

These two meetings, the parade in the morning and the shirt-tail parade last night, the open house and dance at Rothwell Gymnasium, the Journalist's reunion and M men's banquet at the Virginia Grill Friday night and banquets at many of the fraternities and sororities were all a part of the program for the entertainment of the visitors of the University.

The auditorium was filled forty-five minutes before time for the mass meeting Friday night. It was necessary to go out to the Columns, where George Willson presented a large loving cup as a gift of the University women to the Tigers. Senator T. J. Wornall of Kansas City introduced the speakers: Satan Sanderson, L. V. Stigall of St. Joseph, W. T. Nardin of St. Louis, H. F. Schulte and E. L. Nelson.

After the mass meeting an open house and reunion was held at Rothwell Gymnasium. The students of the School of Journalism and alumni held a reunion smoker in Switzer Hall. About 100 heard talks by alumni and visiting newspaper men.

More than 100 men who have won Varsity letters attended the annual M men's banquet at the Virginia Grill Friday night. The importance of getting material for future teams from athletes now playing in high schools was urged by Prof. C. L. Brewer and Coach H. F. Schulte. Lawson Price of Jefferson City was chosen president of the organization. Spencer Harris of Kansas City was former president. Walter Goodson of Marshall, Mo., was elected vice-president and T. K. Catron of Columbia is secretary.

The University Missourian was issued this morning during the parade. The news was received by wireless, printed and delivered while the parade was in progress. The women journalists were in an automobile which followed the boys.

Each class of the University was represented and marched behind the banners. The Academics had a real live lion, with a jayhawk lying prostrate at his feet. The short-horns had a lion in a cage which roamed at will over his cage. Miss Blanche Bauman, Miss Hulda Rollman, Miss Alita Batterton, Miss Lavinia Peters, Miss Clara Dunn represented the University women on a float.

The Farmers had a sour apple tree with the jayhawk.

The parade was headed by Dean J. C. Jones, acting president, and the Board of Curators in automobiles. Governor Major was expected to head the parade but did not get into Columbia on time.

C. H. S. WISS CHAMPIONSHIP

Tied Carrollton High 6 to 6 in Game Yesterday Morning.
