NURSE DOING GOOD WORK

Miss Bryant Teaches Sanitation, Preventive Medicine and Hygiene. Made 1991 visits last year. Attended 148 patients. 84 of her patients suffered from tuberculosis. 20 of these have shown visible improvement. Fumigated 40 houses. Taught 100 families preventive medicine and hygiene.

"Miss Willie Bryant, Columbia's visiting nurse, is doing the greatest work of any person in the city," said the Rev. Madison A. Hart, pastor of the First Christian Church, from his pulpit last Sunday morning. This is also the opinion of a great many people about Columbia. Those who are in touch with her work are confident that she is doing the largest and most consistent social service work ever done in Columbia.

Miss Bryant not only nurses and takes care of many families in Columbia, but she teaches every one she comes in contact with the value of sanitation. In the years she has been here she has taken special pains to impress on the more careless population of Columbia the value of preventing the spreading of disease.

By explaining to these people the social waste of contagious disease, Miss Bryant says that she has not been able to completely cure many of these cases, as they were too far gone. But she has had great success in preventing the disease from getting its hold upon the other members of the family.

Miss Bryant has explained the further need of teaching the negro population of Columbia to take care of themselves, and especially prevent the spread of tuberculosis. Many negroes work in the kitchens and homes of white families. Tuberculosis is transferred most effectively by contact,—that is the tubercular patient using, touching or handling things used by others. Columbia people should be interested in preventing the spread of the disease from a selfish motive, if no other.

The Red Cross stamps that are on sale today go to prevent the spread of the great white plague. Last year 40,000 stamps or \$400 worth were sold in Columbia. Of this sum \$320 went to the salary of Miss Bryant.

They want to make up \$400 of Miss Bryant's salary that way. They believe that every person in Columbia will use some kind of a Christmas stamp, and base their hope on the fact that a Red Cross Seal on a Christmas package has more Christmas spirit in it than any other seal or decoration can give. They are trying to see that a Red Cross Seal is on every letter and package that goes out of Columbia between now and the holidays.
