### MRS. MOSS IS HEAD OF COLLEGE UNION

Organization of Junior Institutions Honors Christian's President in Meeting.

#### CALL SESSION HERE

Catalogues Will Be Discussed—Committee on National Organization Appointed.

A special meeting of the Junior College Union of Missouri will be held at Christian College, Columbia. The date is to be decided upon later. This meeting is called to settle a number of questions pending the next catalogue issue.

The annual meeting was held Tuesday afternoon and night at Cottey College, at Nevada, Mo. The colleges belonging to the Union are: Christian College, Columbia; Cottey College, Nevada; Hardin College, Mexico; Howard-Payne College, Fayette; Stephens College, Columbia; William Woods College, Fulton. Officers for the year were elected as follows: President, Mrs. L. W. St. Clair-Moss; vice-president, J. W. Million; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. V. A. C. Stockard.

The meeting at Nevada was, in a way, a reorganization, the movement having been started in 1902 as an association of presidents of colleges for women in Missouri. Annual meetings have been held and a movement to establish a junior college curriculum, developed into the present organization of the Junior College Union.

Missouri is the only state which has such an organization. It is frequently referred to as the "Missouri Idea."

President Thomas F. Marshall of Oswego College, Oswego, Kan., and President R. R. Thompson of Crescent College, Eureka Springs, Ark., were visitors at the annual meeting. Presidents Wood of Stephens and Hedy of Lindenwood were unable to be present. Stephens College was represented by Secretary Roy P. Davis.

A committee was appointed with a view to organizing a national junior college union. Presidents James M. Wood of Stephens, R. R. Thompson of Crescent, J. W. Million of Hardin and T. F. Marshall of Oswego were appointed on this committee.

### ICE CREAM COURSE PROFITABLE

L. G. Rinkle Has Letters From Students Commenting on Work.

Prof. L. G. Rinkle has had several letters from men who attended the short course in ice cream making, which closed recently, saying that the course had helped them greatly in their work. Some of them are now enabled to make higher profits through the knowledge of by-products they received in the course.

Fourteen men, most of whom had had experience in dairy work, were enrolled in the seven weeks' course in making ice cream. Aside from the technical course in making the cream there were courses in dairying, feeding of cattle, and handling of dairy machinery and equipment. Courses were also given in the production of dairy by-products, with which dairy men are able to avoid what would otherwise be a loss. While here the men organized a club to discuss dairymen's problem.

#### Will Be Candidate for Collector.

B.—The levy submitted for school purposes is not an increase over that of last year but is an increase over the amount that may be levied by the school board without the vote of taxpayers being had. Under the law the school board can only levy up to 40c on the \$100 without such vote. The levy submitted this year is the same levy that has been voted for the past four or five years and if the proposition carries the rate of taxation for school purposes will be the same as in 1913.

### ALUMNI TO HANDLE K. C. INDOOR MEET

Former Track Captains of Missouri and Kansas Arranging Details.

#### MARCH 27 IS DATE

Invitation Events a Feature—Interest This Year Keen, Says Brewer.

"The people of Kansas City are showing a greater interest in the annual Missouri-Kansas indoor meet than ever before," said Prof. C. L. Brewer, director of athletics, this morning. Professor Brewer returned yesterday from Kansas City, where he met W. O. Hamilton, director of athletics at Kansas, to complete arrangements for the big meet March 27.

"Both universities have unusually loyal supporters in the city," continued Professor Brewer, "but the Kansas sympathizers in years past have shown the lesser interest. This year, however, their spirits are high. The meet last year, which was won by Kansas on the last event, did much to encourage the Kansas fans."

The final arrangements for the meet are to be handled by alumni of the competing schools. Shannon Douglass of Kansas City, at one time captain of the Missouri track team, and "Cupid" Haddock, formerly a track captain at Kansas, are the men selected. The details of advertising and ticket selling already have been arranged. The Missouri and Kansas alumni associations have taken blocks of 200 seats each on opposite sides of the hall.

The meet March 27 will be the twelfth annual competition between the two schools. Convention Hall has been the meeting place every time. The events scheduled are the running high jump, 16-pound shot put, pole vault, 50-yard dash, mile, 55-yard high hurdles, 440-yard dash, half-mile, 55-yard low hurdles, 2-mile, and mile relay.

Each team is allowed to enter sixteen men in the meet and may start two of these in each event. The Tiger team has not been chosen.

A number of invitation events have been arranged. There will be five grade-school relays, one high school relay, a 50-yard dash for high schools, an open 50-yard dash, and an open 440-yard dash. In addition, there will be a relay between alumni of Missouri and Kansas. To be eligible for this relay, a man must have been out of school at least five years.

Because of the long trip to Kansas City, Missouri probably will have only a few student rooters at the meet. Kansas will be out in force. A special train will be run from Lawrence the afternoon before the meet to carry the Kansas students and their band.
