In Twelve Innings Only Three Men Reach Third.

It was a twelve-inning, 1-1 game of real baseball which the Missouri Tigers and the Honolulu Chinese played on Rollins Field yesterday afternoon. Honolulu scored in the first. During the next eleven innings no Chinese got as far as third base.

Only two Tigers made third, one man in the fourth inning and one in the seventh when Missouri's score was made. When the game was called on account of darkness both teams were playing a fast game. No man on either side made first base in the eleventh and twelfth innings.

The Chinese made their one in the first inning on errors, a hit and a passed ball. With two men out, Woolsey muffed a grounder and Kan Yin was safe at first.

Mark hit over second and Kan Yin moved up to second base. He went to third on a passed ball. Davis muffed Foster's grounder and Kan Yin went home. Apau Kau fanned with Mark on second.

In the seventh inning, with one down, Woody for Missouri drove the ball into center field for three bases. Palfreyman sent the ball rolling slowly on the ground just inside the first-base foul line.

Akana, first baseman, ran up on the ball and threw home to catch Woody who was coming in from third. The throw was a little high and the catcher had to go up in the air after the ball. Woody was safe.

Another time Missouri came near to scoring, in the fourth, Hall hit for one base and Woody sacrificed him to second. On Palfreyman's hit to center field Hall touched third and tried to make it home. Foster, right fielder, made a long throw home and caught him.

Taylor, pitcher for Missouri, fanned six and walked two. Apau Kau for Honolulu fanned seven and walked none. Davis and Woolsey each muffed a grounder and Woolsey made a bad throw to first giving Missouri three errors.

Ayau, shortstop, made two bad throws to first giving Honolulu two errors. Honolulu got six hits, two of them for two bases. Missouri got eight, three for two bases and one for three. No bases were stolen.
