BABY NAMED IN DEAN'S HONOR

School of Journalism Mo. University Walter Williams Wing Lung Foo

"Dean Walter Williams is back from zigzagging the world, full of ideas, weird tales and ham an' writes Robertus Love in The St. Louis Republic of yesterday. He devotes a whole page to the dean's adventures abroad including his learning to order ham an' in twenty-seven languages.

Besides visiting 2,000 newspapers and learning the national gestures of many countries, the dean succeeded in having a baby named for him, says Mr. Love.

"At Peking the Chinese Journalists' Association gave a dinner for Mr. Williams. He delivered an address. Then the president of the association made a speech. At its close all the Chinese journalists bowed at the dean and clapped their hands and looked exceedingly pleasant. He hadn't the veriest inkling of what was being said, so maintained a sober silence.

"An interpreter then explained to him that the president had said in his choicest postprandial Chinese that he had a new boy at his house and he had named the baby in Dean Williams' honor, its full name being School of Journalism Missouri University Walter Williams Wing Lung Foo.

"Mr. Williams, after his trip, divided the papers of the world into four types—the English, the French, the German and the American type. He said the English newspaper cares what it publishes; the French newspaper cares how it is published, the German newspaper does not care so much as to what or how, but does wish what is published to be sober, serious and full of statistics; the American newspaper, on the contrary, cares when the news is published.

"The Japanese newspapers publish what they call 'hard' and 'soft' news. Hard news is news that is to be believed; soft news is news that the public is not expected to believe. The third page on the Japanese newspaper is referred to by the Japanese journalist as the 'soft' news page."

"The St. Louis Post-Dispatch also had a long story of Dean Williams' trip around the world.

Coloratura Soprano Sang for Friends in Y. M. C. A. Auditorium.

Miss Katharine B. Viley of Kansas City, who has been studying voice this winter under Miss Mary Stewart, favored a number of friends with a recital at the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium Thursday afternoon. Miss Viley has a coloratura soprano voice of good range and of very pleasing quality. Among the special numbers of the ten forming the program Miss Viley sang are "Nymphs at Sylvains," par Bomberg; Aria from Madam Butterfly, and "Villanelle," par E. Dell'Acqua.

Walter B. Roberts' rendition of "Valse Triste," by Sibelius, also was much enjoyed. Miss Viley is a student of French literature at Christian College, having learned the language in several months residence in Paris.

Dix Tichenor, the Kansas City tennis crack, proved too much for the Missourians in the dual tennis tournament between Missouri and Kansas at Lawrence Saturday. C. C. Woods and J. P. Loomis represented Missouri and both were defeated by the star Jay-hacker in the singles.

Both Loomis and Woods, however, defeated the other Kansas man in the singles. The doubles, the deciding match of the tournament, went to Kansas in straight sets. Tichenor and Smith beat Woods and Loomis, 8-6 and 6-4.

The Missouri Valley Conference tennis tournament begins in St. Louis next Thursday. Woods and either Underwood or Loomis will be the Missouri entries. Missouri won both the singles and doubles last year. Woods won the singles and Woods and Swarts the doubles.
