**REEDER VISITS FLOODED AREA**

Most of the Lowlands From McBaine to Cedar City Under Water

"With the river stage 25 feet at Boonville, most of the lowlands from McBaine to Cedar City are covered," said George Reeder, chief of the local weather bureau, who returned today from McBaine, where he went yesterday afternoon to observe the flood conditions.

"The water is a considerable distance from the station at McBaine," continued Mr. Reeder. "It would take a 28-foot stage to put it across the road at McBaine, and there is no present indication of that, as the river will fall slowly from now on. Of course heavy rains in the next four or five days would bring the river up again.

"In the bottoms from McBaine to Cedar City only the high places show and hundreds of acres of the best crop land are under water. Though it is rather late for replanting corn, some of the land will probably be drained in time for replanting.

"Whether or not the corn matures depends on the frost. We have had a temperature of 32 as early as September 18 but the average date of killing frost is about October 15."

**SIMPSON MAY GO ON SPECIAL**

Brewer Hopes to Land Athlete on Coast in Prime Condition.

Robert Simpson, hurdler, will probably leave a week from today to take part in the athletic games at San Francisco. There is to be a special train from Chicago, and C. L. Brewer, athletic director, is trying to make arrangements for Simpson to go on it. The train will stop for a day along the line to give the men a chance to practice and keep them from getting stiff from the long journey. If it is not possible for Simpson to go on the special, he will wait until Mr. Brewer goes after the Summer Session.

Mr. Brewer said that Simpson was in fine condition and that if the trip and change of climate did not trouble him, he expected the boy to do things in athletics that no other 19-year-old boy ever did.

"If we just had Kelley here," said Mr. Brewer, "Bob would win, I know."

"The Eastern men are farces in the high hurdles. The best Ferguson of Yale did in the Eastern try-outs was 16 flat. He does the low hurdles in 24:2. The low hurdle race will be an even match among Loomis, Ferguson and Simpson. If youth always wins over old age, then Bob will win both events, because he is from 3 to 5 years younger than any of the other leading hurdlers."
