DIVORCE MAKES CASE INVOLVED

Woman Files Suit for Judgment Not Shared by Husband.

Dora F. Kurtz has filed suit in the Boone County Circuit Court against James E. Wright and Frank Kurtz to affect an accounting in 147 1-2 acres of land near Perche Creek, in Boone County. The case will be heard at the June term of Circuit Court.

The suit is primarily over three notes which were given by Ezra T. Palmer and wife, as security for which they executed a deed of trust to the Kurtzes, naming J. E. Wright. Palmer has since made default in the paying of the notes, and the land was sold May 29 to satisfy the judgment.

Since the giving of the notes, Kurtz and his wife have been divorced. Mrs. Kurtz claims that two of the notes, the first, for \$1,000 and the second for \$500, payable in one and two years, belonged to her. She contends in her petition that as she was the owner of the first two notes her claims should have first been satisfied by an accounting or that a special lien be declared against the property so she may get her interest. Gillespy & Conley are attorneys for Mrs. Kurtz.




