

SAYS SHE HAS FIGHTING BLOOD

Mrs. Vylla Poe Wilson, A Quakeress, Warns Against Country's Invasion.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—"It is the duty of every American man and woman to do his and her share to make this country safe from invasion."

Such was Mrs. Vylla Poe Wilson's message to America today as she prepared to depart to Lake Geneva, Wis., where she will have charge of the Navy League's training camp for girls, which opens Tuesday.

Mrs. Wilson is the nearest living relative of Edgar Allen Poe, is a great granddaughter of Lord Admiral William Gordon, known to all students of English history; a granddaughter of Mary Elizabeth Ellicott of Ellicott City, Maryland, the oldest Quaker town in the United States; a daughter of George Poe, a distinguished confederate soldier and a relative of General Poe, of Revolutionary war fame.

Mrs. Wilson also is the founder of the Woman's section of the Navy League and of the Section's branch

of National Service Schools which train girls to take their part in making this country a good, safe place in which to live.

"I'm a Quakeress and proud of it," Mrs. Wilson declared. "But I've got some other kind of blood in me—some fightin' blood," she added.

"I don't know how many battleships we need, or how big an army, or how much ammunition, but I do know that experts along these lines—in whom I put absolute trust—say we haven't got enough. It is therefore the duty of every American to make this country safe, whatever that may mean. Personal preparation is the part American women are to play."

Mrs. Wilson, is a little woman with a lot of enthusiasm. When she tells of her military ancestors her eyes snap and it is just possible she is as proud of them as she is of Grandma Ellicott. She also is an author.

"I sold my first story on the strength of my name," Mrs. Wilson said, but admitted that now "they are selling on their merit."

BONDS FAIL TO PASS

Hallsville Doesn't Get New School!—State Fair Exams August 26.

George T. Porter, county superintendent of schools, announced yesterday that three new school buildings will be ready for use in the county this fall. One of these, in the Keene district, is now completed at a cost of \$1,500. A similar building at Zaring is now under construction, and a small school building south of Centralia has been completed.

Seven districts at Hallsville have consolidated their high schools. Bonds for new accommodations for this consolidated school were voted upon, but failed to pass. For this year, teachers of the Hallsville High School will constitute the faculty of the new consolidated school. The Hallsville school has been accredited in the third class.

Mr. Porter will hold the competitive examinations, which will select two Boone County boys as representatives of this county at the State Fair at Sedalia, September 23-30, on Saturday, August 26.

Each county in the state will choose two boys, between the ages of 13 and 17, in competitive examinations in arithmetic, geography and agriculture. The winners will be entertained at the expense of the State Fair Board, and will be provided with tents, cots, meals and admission to the grounds, grandstand and stock pavilion.

The examination will be held by Mr. Porter in his office at the courthouse at 9 o'clock on the morning of August 26. Any boy, between the ages of 13 and 17 will be eligible to take the examination, provided he is a resident of this county.

"From present indications, there will be a large group of contestants," said Mr. Porter, "and it will be a great trip for the boys. We are trying to increase interest in the younger generation of the county, and there is no doubt but what the present plan is a good one. We hope later to be able to send more."
