# RUMANIANS CAPTURE TRANSYLVANIA TOWN

### Sepri Scep Gyorgi and 500 Wagons Are Gained In an Advance.

### 600-PRISONERS TAKEN

### Germans and Bulgars Planning Drive on Bucharest, Capital City.

BUCHAREST, Sept. 6.—Rumanian troops have captured the Transylvanian town of Sepri Scep Gyorgi, taking 500 wagons, much foodstuff and forage.

In Monday's fighting in small encounters along the Upper Mairos Valley in Northeastern Transylvania the Rumanians took more than 600 prisoners.

### Plans Drive on Bucharest.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—A bold German stroke, aiming at the early capture of Bucharest, the capital of Rumania, was revealed in dispatches from Berlin this afternoon.

The Germans and Bulgars have concentrated artillery and men against the strongly fortified Rumanian bridgehead at Tutrakan on the Danube, only forty miles southeast of Bucharest.

The German war office this afternoon announced the capture of seven Rumanian works near the bridgehead, following its occupation of advanced positions yesterday.

The city lies at the end of a railway leading along a river valley directly to Bucharest. The Germans, it is believed here, hope to cross the Danube, strike down this valley and inflict a severe blow on the Rumanians by seizing their capital while the main Russian and Rumanian armies are invading Transylvania.

### British Take Leuze Wood.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—British troops captured the whole of Leuze wood, a mile north of Cambles in heavy fighting last night, General Haig reported this afternoon.

Desperate fighting is going on between Cambles and Ginchey.

### English Airship Destroy U-Boat.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 6.—British airships sighted and destroyed a German submarine in Zeebrugge harbor, returning safely to their base, according to reports this afternoon.

# COMMISSION MEETING

### Joint U. S.-Mexico Meeting Opens Session at New London, Conn.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Sept. 6.—Withdrawal of the American expedition from Mexico is destined to be the first question discussed by the American and Mexican commissioners, who held their first meeting here today in the joint conference, designed to settle all Mexican problems.

The commissioners met for their first session during the morning and were not expected to bring about any great results. Most of the time was taken up, it is understood, in exchanging credentials, getting acquainted and then a general discussion of the withdrawal proposition.

While a definite program has not been agreed upon, the general plans of the conference provide, first, for the discussion of the withdrawal of the Pershing expedition, arranging for a protocol for reciprocal crossing of the border and an investigation of interests behind border raids.

With these subjects disposed of, the commissioners will delve into the basic problem of Mexico's disintegration with a view of correcting existing conditions and rehabilitating the country.
