REGISTER STATE-OWNED HERDS

Missouri Dairy Interests Want Record of Pure-bred Cattle

Because Superintendent Biggs of the state hospital at Fulton is unable to make satisfactory filings of the pedigree of 200 fine Holsteins, the dairy interests of Missouri are working on a legislative bill for the registration of all state-owned herds of cattle.

Pure-bred Holstein cattle were bought for the Fulton institution 30 years ago, but no pedigrees were kept and none filed for the stock raised on the hospital farm. Superintendent Biggs is anxious to record the herd but is unable to do so.

The state dairy interests propose to create without expense to the state a registry board for state institutions, composed of the professor of dairying at the University, the State Dairy Commissioner and the State Veterinarian. This board would oversee the selection of pure-bred sires and the registration of all cattle eligible for pedigrees.

AUSTRALIAN LIKES M. U. SERVICE

Egg Prices and Thermometer Go High in Sydney, Says J. S. Ferguson.

"I am indebted to you for your information which is far and away the best I have ever perused," writes J. Stark Ferguson, of Sydney, Australia, to Prof. H. L. Kempster of the poultry department of the College of Agriculture, in a letter dated August 2, 1916.

The poultry industry in Australia is improving. The chief hindrance to this business in that land is the terrific heat, which, Mr. Ferguson says, sometimes ranges from 104 to 125 degrees.

The Australian eats many eggs, and the demand in Sydney is very great. In winter the price of eggs ranges from 60 to 75 cents a dozen, according to Mr. Ferguson. "A stock of 1,000 layers would clear \$2,000 a year after all expenses had been paid," Mr. Ferguson claims.




