DAIRY 500 IN CONVENTION HALL

Southwest Dairy Show Brings Together Country's Best Milk Cows. By United Press. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 18.—With all the champion Holstein and Jersey cattle in the middle west and some from the east on exhibition, the annual Southwest Dairy Show opened at Convention Hall today. More than 500 of the best milk producing cows in the country are housed in the hall. During the show various dairy appliances will be demonstrated. Government experts also will explain the latest dairy experiment results.

To Teach Farm Engineering. Farm machinery and farm motors, a new 3-hour course in agricultural engineering, will be offered this semester for the first time. The course will be taught by Prof. E. W. Lehmann and will include most of the work formerly given in a course in farm motors and another in farm machinery.

TIGERS AND BROWNS IN MEXICO VICTORY

Manager Taylor Let Visitors Down With Two Safe Hits—Score 8-1

FOSTER HIT WELL

Bryant, Missouri Twirler, "Ty Cobbed" Thomas in 5 Appearances.

It was just a question of how many the Browns would make yesterday afternoon at the Fairgrounds. They scored only 8 to Mexico's 1, but they might have made 8 more with a little luck. Eleven of the locals were stranded during the eight innings.

The hitting of Bryant, Foster and Davis and the twirling of Taylor enlivened an otherwise slow game. Bryant, who has been playing with Hannibal this summer, poled out a homer, a double and a single and got two walks in five times up, while Foster obtained a triple and two singles. Davis' long single put three men across the plate in the fifth and his triple to left accounted for the last run in the seventh.

Manager Taylor allowed the Mexico Athletics but two hits and would have shut them out but for an infield error in the fourth. The only other time the visitors were dangerous was in the eighth and Davis' catch of a foul over the wire fence saved Taylor then. Twelve men fanned on Taylor's shoots. The Browns' outfielders didn't have a chance.

Thomas' wildness in the first inning cost him some runs. Two walks following Foster's hit filled the bases. Foster came across on a wild pitch and the other two men counted a moment later when Bryant doubled past third. A fielder's choice and a lucky hit by Rutledge filled the bases again in this inning, but Vogt fanned and Watson made a nice running catch of Davis' liner. A pretty stab by the Mexico left-fielder again in the second saved Thomas. There were two out and three on at the time.

Davis' liner to right center sent three Browns across in the fifth, while Bryant's hard hit to left, which rolled to the bushes for a home run, made another in the sixth. Davis tripled in the seventh and scored on Ligon's infield out.
