

WILL HOLD SPECIAL SERVICES Churches of City to Plan Campaigns for Students of M. U.

According to their usual custom most of the churches of the city will hold special services for students on October 8. The Baptist Church, the Wilkes Boulevard Methodist Church, the congregation of which is composed chiefly of townspeople, and the Calloway Episcopal Church, which is temporarily without a minister, are the exceptions. Many of the churches have student Sunday school classes. These will meet next Sunday morning. The programs for the special services have not yet been arranged. The Rev. Madison A. Hart of the First Christian Church announces that the student members of his congregation will take part in the church activities next Sunday. Students are invited to attend the Episcopal church also on that day, when the Rev. R. L. Putney of Macon City will have charge of the services.

DEMOCRATS IN PLAN TO HOLD THIS STATE

Missouri Regarded as Doubtful, Says J. E. Boggs, Home From Meeting.

MORE CASH NEEDED

Reports of Early Campaign Tours Claim Success in All Respects.

"The Democratic State Committee is in bad shape financially. Contributions have not started to come in yet. But things have been started now and we will get the money."

So says J. E. Boggs, Democratic state committeeman from the Eighth District, this morning upon his return from the meeting of the committee in St. Louis yesterday. Frederick D. Gardner, Democratic candidate for governor, attended the meeting of the thirty-two committeemen, and the campaign of the present administration to retain the seat of power in Missouri took definite form. No effort will be spared by the state committee in putting forth the rea-

sons why the present administration should remain in power, according to Mr. Boggs.

"All committeemen reported great success for the campaign tours that are now under way over the state," said Committeeman Boggs. "We are not over-confident of carrying the state, and it is going to take lots of work and money to do so. But we feel the record of the past administration will be approved by the voters of Missouri in November."

Missouri is listed among the half-dozen doubtful states in the Middle West which are expected to decide the national election. Extensive tours by Colonel Gardner and United States Senator James A. Reed were scheduled at the meeting in St. Louis yesterday.

Former Governor Lon V. Stephens was succeeded by former Judge Daniel G. Taylor of St. Louis as Democratic elector at large. The action was taken by the committee because Mr. Stephens is director of the Federal Reserve Bank. Federal office holders are ineligible to act as electors.

M. U. MEN CAN'T ENROLL IN H. S.

Will Not Be Allowed to Take Commercial Courses.

University students will not be allowed to enroll in the commercial courses of the Columbia High School, J. E. McPherson, superintendent of schools, declared today. However, students who have conditional work in high school subjects may enter the high school by paying a tuition. Graduates from the high school will be permitted to do post graduate work in any of the courses offered.

"We haven't the room or equipment to accommodate University students in the commercial courses," Superintendent McPherson said. "We must first look to the interests of the students of Columbia."

The action of the superintendent was approved by the school board at their meeting last night.
