## SPORT NEWS and COMMENT

With the first game less than two weeks away and with the first conference game—the one with Washington—less than three weeks away, work for the fifty men who are out for the Varsity squad will begin in earnest this week. Scrimmage either with the scrubs or the freshmen will be on the program each afternoon and every man, no matter how green or how light, will be given his chance to do what he can to make the 1916 Tigers a formidable machine.

The backfield candidates will be given the most attention for Schulte is planning a whirlwind attack and needs at least one well-trained set of backs. Despite the flash made by the new men in the early scrimmaging, it is fairly certain that there will be a preponderance of veterans behind the line.

Drop-kicking and punting will come in for their share of attention from Coach Schulte, for no one realizes better than he the importance of a good kicker in winning games. Haines easily has the call in either department and, were it not for his lack of weight, would be an important factor in the new machine.

Despite the number of M men back in harness and a wealth of new material, Coach Schulte continues to be pessimistic over the general outlook for a successful season. It is true, as he says, that the teams on Missouri's schedule have also been strengthened, but it is extremely doubtful whether they have improved to the extent that the Tigers have. Washington has gained in strength probably as much or more than the Bengals, but the other teams are hardly much above their 1915 front. It is unfortunate that such an important contest as the one with Washington should come so early in the season, but there is one consolation for Tiger fans—Coach Schulte smiles whenever the Pikers are mentioned.


