

SPORT NEWS and COMMENT

Varsity 14, Freshmen 0. This was the net result of a forty-minute game between the two squads yesterday afternoon. But even this score—the closest between the two teams in a regular game for years—does not begin to give proper credit to the rookies, who astonished the fans by their clever forward-passing and by their fighting spirit. Two touchdowns, one the result of an intercepted forward pass and both made in the last few minutes of the halves, was the most that the regulars could do in the four ten-minute periods.

While the Varsity was able to gain on split formations and through the line, they were badly outplayed at the open game. Out of four forward passes attempted by the regulars three were intercepted and the other was a failure. Of the nine attempted by the freshmen, two were intercepted, four were not completed and three went in to the waiting arms of their own forwards.

Freshmen Gain Via Aerial Route.

Gardere grabbed two of these passes out of the air in the third quarter, each was good for about twenty yards gain. Cross, who comes from Lathrop caught the other and also intercepted one. He is light but he put up a scrappy game and with any kind of a line and teamwork in the backfield would have made good games in carrying the ball. Ewing, who seemed to have difficulty getting his bearings in the first half, got into the game towards the last and grabbed the other two Varsity passes, besides putting up a good exhibition in stopping opposing backs. Collins was another freshman in the game every minute and he succeeded in smothering several of the regulars before they could get to the line of scrimmage. Weaver and Lee at the tackles were holding up the Varsity plays for a while but couldn't stand up against

the experience and condition of the older men. The rest of the line showed fight but were unable to do much against the skill of their opponents.

Line Opened Some Good Holes.

The regular line men played most of the game and presented a good defense to the rookies. They also worked better in opening up holes for the split plays and straight line plunges. Slusher and Giltner started at ends but the former was soon replaced by Wilder, who played brilliantly for the rest of the tilt.

The freshmen lined up at the start as follows: Roop, center; Meyer and McAnaw, guards; Lee and Weaver, tackles; Ligon and Collins, ends; Cross and Greenwood, halves; Ewing, fullback; Porter, quarter. Others who played were Fivecoat, Franklin, Cockshoot, Gardere, Hamren and Andrews.

The Varsity line-up was: Lansing, center; McAnaw and Preston, guards; Van Dyne and Muir, tackles; Slusher and Giltner, ends; McMillan and Collins, halves; Stankowski, quarter; Rider, fullback. Others who played were Shy, Wittenberg, Viner, Rutledge, White, Morris, Groves, Wyatt and Hamilton.

The "Indian" Exhibits Two Sets of Backs.

Several different backfields were used by Schulte and though they made gains at times they showed a lack of skill in their attacks. Not

until six minutes of the second quarter had been played did Bill Collins cross the line for the first touchdown and it was only after Hamilton had intercepted a forward pass and ran forty yards that Stankowski made their second score about two minutes before the final whistle blew. Bill Muir kicked both goals.

McMillan, Rider, Collins and Stankowski started and finished in the regular backfield and did the most consistent offensive work of the afternoon. Collins and Rider both went through the line for good gains while McMillan's footwork got him yardage. Interference was Stankowski's specialty and with some help from the others showed signs of the offensive team-play that Schulte is trying to develop.

Fumbles were scarcer than usual, the only bad slip being made by the Varsity allowing the freshmen to recover one of their own punts. Rutledge made a fine return of a punt in the third quarter and played good ball at the pivot position. Viner intercepted one of the freshmen passes.

These Men Eligible To Play Football.

The eligibility list for the football squad was passed on last night at a meeting of the committee on inter-collegiate athletics. The new conference rule which says that each player must make a certain minimum of

credits during the previous year brought about a close investigation of the records of the men and the results were very satisfactory. Forty-four men were placed on the list while only four were declared ineligible. None of these four men was on the first or second team. 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DOG TAX DUE!

NOTICE is hereby given that an Ordinance adopted by the Council of the City of Columbia, Mo., on the 2nd day of November, 1915, provides that "No dog above the age of FOUR MONTHS shall be permitted to remain in the City of Columbia, Mo., unless such dog shall be registered, and the License tax imposed thereon by ordinance shall be paid by the owner thereof." The license tax, including fees, is \$1.75 payable at the office of the City Collector, for the year beginning October 1st, 1916.

It is a Misdemeanor to keep a dog in the City without having the same registered.
