

**SPORT NEWS and COMMENT**

Missouri's unexpected variety of attack against Central Saturday, Nebraska's big score against Drake, the poor showing of Kansas at Urbana, the comparatively poor scoring ability shown by Washington and Ames' low score against Highland Park furnish the Valley football fan with plenty of dope on which to speculate as to future results.

On the showing Saturday Nebraska, looms up to repeat as Valley champion, as neither Ames nor Kansas showed anywhere near enough stuff to cope with a team of the Cornhuskers' caliber and even with the good showing Saturday Missouri can hardly be counted in a class with Nebraska. The Kansas Aggies in their game Friday showed great scoring ability.

**Kansas Showing is Disappointing.**  
Kansas was disappointing in its Big Nine game. Even against the Illinois second squad, Coach Olcott's team could do nothing, while the Zuppke regulars, led by Macomber, romped on the Jayhawkers at will. The Pikers did little against Rose Polytechnic until the latter part of the game when their offensive put over a couple of touchdowns. The strength of Washington's opponents is not known, however.

This week's games should furnish a real line on Valley teams. Washington and Missouri will meet here and Ames will meet Kansas at Ames. On the following Saturday Ames comes to Columbia for a bout with the Tigers, which game will give a straight line on the comparative ability of Kansas and Missouri. The contest between the Kansas Aggies and Nebraska next Saturday should also prove interesting.

**Class Football Games**  
**When Tigers Leave Columbia.**  
The class football games will be played October 28, when the Tigers are away for their first trip. The seniors will meet the sophomores and the freshmen will play the juniors on that date. The two winning teams will meet on November 11, when the Varsity goes to Manhattan for the Kansas Aggie game. The teams are being organized under the direction of Coach Miller, who is now coaching the freshman squad.

**More Men Needed For Cross Country.**  
H. McC. Burrowes, in charge of cross-country, issued a call for more runners at the conclusion of Saturday's preliminary race. There are only twelve men on the Varsity squad, which is not a sufficient number to assure Missouri of a gilt-edged representation in the valley this year. According to Mr. Burrowes a squad of at least thirty men is necessary, and it is hoped more candidates will be on hand tomorrow, when training for the Ames meet will begin.

The results of the preliminary race Saturday were favorable considering the material. The time made over the three-mile course by Captain William Simon was the best made in the last few years, and with more men of his caliber, Missouri will have no fear. Next Saturday the qualifying races for the Ames' meet, October 21, will be held. The first six men to finish in this race will be selected to represent Missouri.

**Faculty Directory Gets to Press.**  
The copy of the official register of officers of instruction and administration of the University has gone to press and will be delivered in a few days, according to Russell Monroe, assistant University publisher. Several changes are noted in the directory this year. It will be 3 by 6 inches, instead of 6 by 9 to make it more convenient for handling. A list of all departments, with the chairman of each, is added. The edition will be 500 copies.

**None But the Scribes Admitted to Secret Practice.**  
Secret practice will again be the order on Rollins Field the coming week, in fact, none but reporters will be admitted until after the Ames game on October 21. The real grind for the Washington game will commence and the big, scrappy freshmen will get plenty of chances to show their ability against the Varsity. The first-year men will concentrate on Washington's plays so that the Tiger defense will not be caught unprepared when the Pikers roll into town next Saturday.

Pittam, White, Marshall, and Haines, four backfield men who were out of the game during most of last week's workouts, are again in condition and will be worked to the finish in an attempt to put together a win. The interference shown against Central will be difficult to improve upon, but if any of these men can do better, it is certain that they will be given a chance, for teamwork is to be
