KEWPIES TO PLAY KEMPER

Local Team Has Scored 129 Points in Two Games This Season.

Since the decisive victory over Sedalia Tuesday, the Columbia High School eleven is eagerly awaiting the referee's whistle which will send it into battle with the Kemper Military Academy of Booneville at 3 o'clock to-

orrow afternoon at the Fairgrounds. The local team has compiled a total of 129 points in the two games played this season and is anxious to continue its string of victories by defeating the Cadets. Kemper was outclassed in its game with the Warrensburg Normal team early in the season, but staged a comeback by trouncing the Montgomery High School eleven 40-0. Tomorrow's contest will see two of the strongest preparatory teams in the state clash for the title.

Coach Schooler says his men are in good condition for the game and will present a varied attack against the heavy Kemper line. The Columbia line will average 162 pounds, while the backfield will average 158 pounds. The game will be called at 3 o'clock, with C. R. Woody as referee and Grant Wyatt as umpire.

First of County Rallies Will Be Held at Rocheport Tomorrow.

STUDENTS TAKE POLL

A. N. Lindsey, Defeated Candidate, to Speak Here October 27.

The Wilson-Gardner Club, working in conjunction with the State Democratic Committee and the local committees, is engaged in reaching all Democrat voters in this county. Beginning tonight, when fifteen prominent local Democrats will speak at Rocheport, meetings will be held every night at neighboring towns in an effort to get out the maximum vote in the coming election.

At the weekly meeting of the Wilson-Gardner Club at the courthouse tonight, Dr. J. Wesley of Columbia a life-long Republican, will tell why he will vote the Democratic ticket in November. John Dey, conductor on the M. K. & T. Railroad, will speak on the merits of the Adamson Eight-Hour Law. Judge W. S. Pratt also will talk. W. H. Sapp, candidate for representative, will address the Centralia Democrats Friday night.

Paul Prosser of Fayette and Judge Charles Mayer of St. Joseph will be the headliners of the Democratic rally at Sturgeon, Thursday, October 26. Besides these two, there will be other speakers.

A. N. Lindsey, who was a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, will speak at the Columbia courthouse Friday night and at Ashland Saturday night.

W. D. Vandiver of St. Louis will speak in the Columbia courthouse at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Saturday night Mr. Vandiver and A. T. Dunn of Jefferson City will speak to Democrats at Hallsville.

Local Democrats are making strong efforts to have Colonel Frederick D. Gardner, Democratic nominee for governor, speak in Columbia on October 30. Colonel Gardner will talk at Centralia that afternoon, and he has been requested by the Wilson-Gardner Club to come to Columbia at night. Should he consent, his presence will be made the occasion for a Democratic jubilee.

J. E. Boggs, circuit clerk, has announced a tentative schedule of dates for next week. Meetings will be held at Hinton Monday night, at Harrisburg Tuesday night and possibly at Huntsdale Wednesday night. The speakers for these meetings have not been selected as yet.

The Students' Democratic Club of the University this afternoon began a poll of the voters of Columbia to supplement the poll already taken of Boone County voters outside of Columbia. The club will meet at 7:15 o'clock tonight in the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium.

ART EXHIBIT OPENS IN LIBRARY

Works of Twenty-Five Leading American Painters Are Shown.

The art exhibit, sent by the American Federation of Arts, will open tonight at 8 o'clock in the Faculty Room of the Library. The exhibit is the work of twenty-five leading American artists. It is representative of widely divergent artistic styles from the sedate work of twenty-five years ago to the modern paintings of John F. Carlson and Charles Warren Eaton.

The exhibit is composed of figure subjects, landscapes, decorative pictures and portraits by leading American artists, such as Jonas Lie, F. C. Frieske, Randall Davey, Fred J. Waugh, Crisp and M. S. Page.

Tonight, the faculty is invited to the exhibit and during the remainder of the two weeks it is open to the public. Lectures and talks on the paintings will be given.

BIOLOGY EXHIBIT TO BE MOVED

Corridors of Biology Building To Be Used For Museum.

The first and second floor corridors of the Biology Building are to be used for a museum to exhibit biological specimens. The specimens are to be moved from the old museum in the Geology Building, and placed in four large glass display cases.

Among the specimens to be moved are birds and fish of every description, antlers and heads of large animals, stuffed animals, reptiles, and a collection of bird skins, which were presented to the University in 1913 by Commodore George Salisbury.

Prof. W. C. Curtis says it will probably take all year to move and arrange the exhibit.

STUDENT DIRECTORY TO COST \$1

High Price of Paper Necessitates Increase—To Be Out November 1.

Owing to the greatly increased cost of white paper and printing production it has been necessary to raise the

price on the student and faculty directory that is issued each year as a supplement to the Missourian. For the last three years the directory has sold for fifty cents. The cost this year will be \$1.

The directory will be given free to all Missourian subscribers who have receipts showing a four months paid subscription at twenty-five cents a month, as in former years.

The directory this year will contain the names, telephone numbers, home addresses and Columbia addresses of students and faculty members in the University, Stephens and Christian colleges. Fifteen hundred copies of the directory will be printed.

The directory will be ready for distribution before November 1.

Government Club Reorganized.

The Missouri Government Club has been reorganized with D. H. Holloway as president and W. C. Wells as secretary. This club was first organized two years ago to study Missouri problems of government and furnish information to members of the Legislature. The membership is limited to fifteen students in law or political science. At present the club is making a study of child welfare legislation.
