

LIKES COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

Prof. W. J. Shepard Tells Class It Is Best Form for Cities.

To sweep away the complexity and confusion of the machinery of municipal government and give the responsibility into the hands of a few who can be really held accountable to the people is the surest way to secure efficiency in municipal administration, according to Walter J. Shepard, professor of political science and public law in the University.

"The old form of municipal government, consisting of mayor, aldermen and council, leads to corruption,

graft and miscarriage of the people's will," Professor Shepard told his class in American government yesterday. "We are getting away from the old idea of the equilibrium or separation of powers. We are coming to believe in giving large chunks of power to an individual so that he can accomplish something; and at the same time we have someone to hold responsible for the conduct of affairs."

M. U. STUDENTS CAN VOTE HERE

Ballots of Nov. 7 Will Be Mailed to Home Towns, Says J. E. Boggs.

"Four or five hundred University students who are away from home November 7 this year will take advantage of a Missouri election law which permits them to vote in Columbia, and their ballots will be mailed to their home towns to be counted in the regular election returns," said J. E. Boggs, Circuit Clerk of Boone County, this afternoon.

The "absentee law," as it is called, applies only in Missouri, and such voting can be done only in the limits of this state. Voters who are in Illinois or any other state on election day cannot vote by the mail system, according to Chairman Drabelle of the Board of Election Commissioners. Students from other states will follow the laws of their home states.

Any voter whose name is properly registered can go to any polling place anywhere in Missouri and ask for an "absentee blank," and cast his vote. The "absentee ballots" contain the names of the national and state candidates; blank spaces are left on which to write the names of city or township candidates.

The voter must take the ballot into a booth, fill it out and turn it over to the judges of the election. The judges will place the "absentee ballots" in an envelope and turn them over to the county clerk or election commissioners of the district. The county clerk must promptly mail the ballots to the election officials in the home towns of the voters.

When the election officials receive such ballots, they must find from the registration lists or election records whether the voter is entitled to vote and tabulate it with the official count.

BELIEVES THE BREMEN IS LOST

U. S. Manager of German Underseas Company Gives Up Hopes.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 20.—Paul G. L. Hilken admitted this afternoon that the German merchant submarine Bremen is a month overdue and that he feared the vessel had met with an accident and had been lost with her entire crew.

This is the first time that anyone in a position to know the German

side of the story has permitted his name to be used in connection with the belief that the ship is lost. Hilken is the American manager of the company owning the Bremen and its sister ship, the Deutschland.

Hilken returned to Baltimore today from New London, Conn., where, for weeks, he has been awaiting the arrival of the Bremen. He made no effort to hide the grief he felt over the loss of the vessel and the death of the crew, thirty officers and men. He has received advices from Ger-

many that the members of the families of the Bremen crew are mourning them as dead.

Hilken said the U-53 had probably been sent to this side to search for the Bremen. He denied that more than one Bremen was built.
