Local Patrol Wants Club-Room—Also to Go After New Members.

20 CITIZENS ASSIST

Committee of Business Men Aid Boys in Advisory Capacity.

"I promise to be trustworthy, loyal, courteous, cheerful, clean, reverent, helpful, friendly, kind, obedient, thrifty, and brave."

Any Boy Scout can tell what this means because it is the twelve-pointed law which he has promised to obey. He remembers these points in all his dealings; learns them as his moral code of living.

Every Friday afternoon Columbia's thirty-four Boy Scouts start out in search of new information which the scout world has to offer. They usually hike to their cabin in the woods—their frontier cabin as they like to call it—situated about two miles southeast of Columbia.

For this promotion not mere military training as is often thought, is necessary, but practical work in all lines is required. The Boy Scout never forgets that he is to live according to the twelve points. He is always ready for and capable of service. He can give information on any number of questions; knows how to build a camp fire under woods conditions, how to give first-aid treatment, how to conduct a meeting according to Robert's Rules of Order, and how to explain the composition and history of the American flag.

In June of 1915 sixteen Columbia boys obtained a charter from the national organization and became real Boy Scouts. The Scout Masters at that time were E. C. Abbott and O. R. Johnson. The enrollment increased until at the end of the first year there were forty-two members.

Two campaigns are now being undertaken by the Boy Scouts. The boys are working for a club room downtown to be used as their meeting place. Here would be hung all their trophies and the relics they have collected on their hikes.

fraught with elements of danger—accidents are bound to occur. Under the operation of a workmen's compensation act the burden of industrial accidents is divided among all the three parties to it: (1) the employe or his family through the loss of part of his wages; (2) the employer, through the payment of insurance premiums much of which can be shifted to the public through the agency of price, like any other increase in cost; (3) the consuming public, the satisfaction of whose wants really occasioned the accident.

Every country in Europe has had some such provision for industrial accidents for years. None has ever given it up. Three-fourths of the states in the United States have such acts in operation, including states of less industrial importance than Missouri. In none of them is it even seriously proposed to go back to the old planless and really expensive method still in force in Missouri.
