## NEWS and COMMENT

The Kansas Jayhawkers have come back. There can no longer be any doubt that "Beau" Olcott, with the assistance of "Pottay" Clark, has turned out one of the best teams Kansas has had in recent years. Kansas had a good team last year, and this year the men who teach athletics at the Kaw River school have developed a powerful, heavy eleven with an overhead attack as well as ability to plunge. Men who saw the Jayhawkers play last Saturday say the team is fully 50 per cent stronger than last year's eleven. Last year was the first time Kansas has beaten Missouri in the reign of "Indian" Schulte. Olcott was the man to do it, and this year Olcott has made his team about twice as good as it was a year ago. Kansas, starting the season in poor form, has really pulled one of the greatest comebacks in the Missouri Valley.

### Big Question At Present; (Can Tigers Come Back?)

Can Missouri come back? There is no doubt that the Tigers, in the form they showed in the Oklahoma game, would be equal or superior to the Jayhawkers. Missouri, having all the men she started the season with, would easily be the peer of any team of the Valley. But Missouri, through injuries and other forms of hard luck, has been on the downward path since Oklahoma was turned back. If Missouri defeats Kansas it will be a comeback greater than the one staged by Kansas, for it will mean that the Tiger coach has taken a great eleven, developed it to a high standard, had visions of an undefeated season, seen his team gradually crumble and fall before his eyes through no fault of his own, and then gradually come back into its mid-season form and defeat a team that will have a 20-pound advantage in weight and is looked on as the strongest team in the Valley right now.

Kansas are jubilant over the Nebraska victory. They have a right to be, but they are no happier over that game than are Missourians, as it gives the Tigers a chance to claim high honors in the Valley through a victory over the Jayhawkers.

### Schulte Is Polishing Tigers in Secret.

The practice is secret now, and only one or two newspaper correspondents are allowed on the field. Schulte is putting the finishing touches on his Bengal band. To one who sees the Tigers work out, there is little doubt that Schulte and the 1916 Tigers are going to stage one of the biggest comebacks ever dreamed of in the Missouri Valley.

The Tigers are being given only light work. The second and third-string men are now used against the freshmen, with occasionally a regular backfield man in the line-up. Yesterday Harry Viner ripped through the freshmen just as if they weren't there. White also did some good ground gaining, and Brawner, the youngster who has been out of the game all season because of a "charley horse," was again dodging and squirming through for long gains.

### Regulars Are Kept Out of Scrimmage.

Schulte is using a new system of training his linemen. For fear that some of them will become more seriously hurt than at present, the Tigers' teacher is keeping them out of scrimmage. But all the second-string linemen—Whittenberg, Shannon, Hudson and others—are lined up against the freshman with the Varsity men right behind them. The Varsity men criticize the beginners, telling them what to do and what not to do. In this way the youngsters learn football from actual experience, and the Varsity men learn many things from watching their understudies.

### Morris Hurt Saturday; Other Cripples Improving.

"Bunny" Morris is the latest addition to the list of biffed-up Bengals. "Bunny's" arm was injured in the Drake game, and he did not put on a suit yesterday. With a few days' rest, he will be in good shape. Wilder and Giltner are improving, but they are far from being in good shape. Shy is getting along fairly well and should be ready to help pluck the Jayhawker's feathers.

### Cornhuskers Have Best Valley Scoring Machine.

Nebraska is not only at the top of the Missouri Valley Conference in percentage of games won and lost but also leads in the number of points scored. The Cornhuskers have tallied 111 times, and their goal line has been crossed but twice for a total of 13 points. The Kansas Aggies are next with 107 points to their credit, but 36 points have been scored against them. Missouri, with ninety-nine points on the good side and twenty-one on the other, comes next. Kansas has tallied but sixty-eight times and has been scored against for a total of fifty-nine points. Ames has a record of fifty-five and twenty-two.

Thus Missouri, with the exception of Nebraska, has a larger margin between points scored and the points

scored against it than any of the others.

### Did You Know Missouri Lost To Louisiana?

Missouri has played one game of which the Tiger rooters know nothing. The following dispatch in the Tulsa (Okla.) Daily World of November 19, shows that some of Schulte's warriors have been stealing a few marches on him:

"BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 18.—Louisiana State University swamped Missouri University here 41 to 0. After the first period it appeared only a question of the size of the score. Both teams used a number of substitutes."

### Bob Simpson's Record Is Allowed by A. A. U.

Bob Simpson's record of 0:14 3-5 in the 120-yard high hurdles has been allowed by the A. A. U., now in session in New York, and the Bosworth boy is now the undisputed champion high hurdler of the world. Simpson twice ran the distance in 0:14 3-5 last year, once in the Missouri Valley Conference meet and once in the Western Conference meet.

### Nebraska Game Does Not Cripple Kansans.

Contrary to expectations, Kansas came out of the Nebraska game without a serious injury. In days gone by, when Nebraska would always go beyond the 25-point mark in her victories over the Jayhawkers, there were always two or three men who spent the next few days on crutches.
