The Jayhawkers finished their last practice last night. With the field illuminated by great arc lamps the disciples of Olcott labored until long after the cows had gone home and then went to the Country Club to stay until the game. The men are in perfect condition, according to reports

from Lawrence. There is no sign of staleness and no injuries. The last practice was secret. Just what the opening line-up will be is not definitely known.
