The question of what Missouri is going to do for pole vaulters during the coming track season is still being generally discussed. The lack of top-notch material this year recalls the fact that this is the first time in four years that Missouri has not had a man who could clear at least eleven feet. Three years ago Floyd, Powell and Browne were all doing twelve feet. Floyd had no trouble in placing in all meets without any great amount of training. Last year Powell was still left of the trio, but his graduation leaves the team without any of the old school. At present, Bond and Sylvester are the best hopes in this sport. Both are excelling the 10-foot mark, with good chances of their being able to raise this before the opening of the season. Pattinson, the trump card of Kansas this year, seems to have an open field, his record of 11 feet 8 1/2 inches, made at the conference meet last year, putting him out of the class of Missouri's talent.

No Send-Off When Bob Left for N. Y.

Only one University student went to the train Sunday to see Simpson off for New York City and the race that was to bring another world's record to Columbia. This statement, by one of the University coaching staff, would give the impression that the University students do not appreciate the honor Bob has brought to the University of Missouri as a hurdler. Columbia High Schools Will Play February 13.

The basketball teams of Columbia High School and the University High School will meet for the first time this year, February 13, in the Columbia High School gymnasium. A second game between the two rival teams of Columbia is being planned as a preliminary to one of the University games later in the season. Don Selbie, coach of the University High School squad, is trying to arrange games for his team with the Kirksville and Booneville quintets the nights following its game with the Columbia High School team here. The University High will play a return game with Moberly, February 2.

Kansas Takes Two From Kansas Aggies.

Kansas took two straight games of basketball from the Kansas Aggies at Lawrence Tuesday and Wednesday nights. The score of the first game was 34 to 16, and the second 27 to 19.

The first game, being the first of the conference season for Kansas on her own court, resulted in an easy victory. The Jayhawkers took an early lead and outplayed the Aggies from the start. The Aggies' first field goal was not made until the first half was almost finished. Reynolds made the only Aggie basket of the half.

The Aggies scored three times during the second half. Fullington and Kecker each scored from the field when the period was half over. After that the Aggies were able to score only one free basket.

The Jayhawkers played well, their floor play and close guarding being especially effective. Gibbens and Laslett were the Kansas stars. Laslett's interception of Aggie passes was largely responsible for the low score of his opponents. Gibbens led the Jayhawkers in scoring with five baskets. The Aggie forwards had few chances to score.

GIVES \$120,000 TO ILLINOIS

University Will Use Congressman McKinley's Gift for Infirmary.

President Edmund J. James of the University of Illinois announced the gift from Congressman William B. McKinley, ninth Illinois district, of stocks and bonds of a par value of \$120,000, to enable the trustee of the University to build an infirmary for its students and faculty. The gift makes the total donations of Congressman McKinley to the university more than \$250,000, and raises the total from private donors in the last five years, to half a million dollars.

Congressman McKinley's gift is intended to make possible a unique and thorough health service for the university. It is planned to show what can be done to prevent disease in such a large aggregate of population as is formed by the 5,400 students on the university campus.

VINCENT HEADS FOUNDATION

University of Minnesota President Elected by Rockefeller Trustees.

Dr. George E. Vincent, head of the University of Minnesota, was elected president of the Rockefeller Foundation at the annual meeting in New York yesterday. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., the former president, was elected to fill the newly created position of chairman of the Board of Trustees. Doctor Vincent's elevation to the presidency of the foundation came a few minutes after his election to membership in the Board of Trustees. He is to serve until 1920, and will take office about May 1. The selection of Doctor Vincent to conduct the foundation's work was announced several months ago.

"The Four Husbands," a musical comedy, will be at the Hall Theater Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights. The company is under the same management as "The Night Clerk," which was produced at the Hall this season. There are twenty persons in the cast, a number of good song hits, and clever dancing.

PROTESTS OFFICER'S REMOVAL

Mrs. J. E. Wrench, Health Committee Head, Praises Pennington's Work.

Mrs. J. E. Wrench, chairman of the health committees of the Columbia Charity Organization and the Civic League, protests against the temporary suspension of J. L. Pennington, health officer. She says she believes Columbia people are not in favor of doing away with his services. Mrs. Wrench names these results of Mr. Pennington's work:

"He has served more than 100 written notices on families for sanitary improvements, and more than this number of verbal notices, and investigated several times to see that the work was done. On one street one house has already been torn down, and another will follow. Residents on two streets have been notified recently for hygienic reasons.

"He has caused the removal of street refuse, such as dead animals. In his work with business houses he has seen that the refuse cans have been cleaned and covered. He has made them mend places where the cleaning water ran into the street. Those who have walked through the mud on Eighth street will appreciate the present condition.

He has inspected the bad cleaning of poultry, had meat taken off the streets, alleys cleaned.

"He has made 24 houses connect with city water—and use it. He has notified six happy-go-lucky negro drivers to get sanitary garbage wagons or give up collection."

"The important feature of Mr. Pennington's work is that these cases must be followed up. Otherwise, the notices will be ignored and the city will have to prosecute and lose more money than the salary of the health officer. The health officer can do what the police cannot, for he can advise and remedy matters in which blue coats and buttons would only make trouble. If this important work is allowed to slide now it will be a waste in time and efficiency, a loss in civic health and cleanliness and a neglect

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of individual cases, for people do get sick in spite of cold weather."
