

COMMUNITY'S DREAM IS REALIZED, HE SAYS

The Rev. Ernest S. Redd, Negro, Calls Fred Douglass School Star of Hope.

TO BE A MONUMENT Building Marks Generosity of Other Race, Speaker Says at Dedication.

The following address was delivered at the laying of the cornerstone of the Fred Douglass School last Sunday afternoon by the Rev. Ernest S. Redd, negro, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, in the Douglass School Auditorium:

"Communities and men are alike. They both dream dreams and have visions. And there comes a day for the community, as well as for the individual, when dreams come true and life's fondest fancy begins to shape itself into a living reality. For us that day has appeared.

"A quarter of a century ago, and more, a building erected upon this ground was in a manner consecrated to the purpose of public instruction. That building, having served its day, has passed its period of usefulness, and we have gathered here to witness those solemn ceremonies that shall mark the passing of the old and worn structure to make room for the new and better one. We have come to be observers of those mystic rites that shall dedicate this modern temple of knowledge, and, by our presence here, to confess our interest in this progressive movement and our recognition of its moral effects upon the people of our own race.

"The building to be erected will when completed, stand here as a monument to the power of faith and fearlessness as displayed by a few choice spirits who labored persistently against odds to bring their faith to realization; it will abide here as a testimonial of the value of co-operation and united effort as shown by the male citizens of the race who, at the appointed time, translated their wishes into votes and their votes into results; it will exist here as a mark and an indication of the community spirit and community pride possessed by the people of this renowned educational center; it will remain here, as a token of the generous-heartedness of the Board of Education and of our friends of the other race, who have conspired to make this occasion a glorious possibility. We would be ungrateful and unappreciative if we did not by this, or some equally appropriate means acknowledge our indebtedness to the State and to the City of Columbia for this demonstration of their generosity and unflinching good-will.

"Let us pray that this spot, hallowed by a thousand tender memories may become the throbbing heart of our community life; that this ground may become the common level where men of both races may meet on terms of a perfect understanding. Let us pray that this site may be regarded as neutral territory where the adherents of the various religious sects will forget their differences and unite as supplicants at a throne of wisdom. Let us pray once again that this structure may be a shining star of hope to parents concerned about the welfare of their children and a spur to ambitious efforts of the boys and girls, young men and maidens, living now and yet unborn, who shall have the privilege of entering within its portals.

"May its very presence inspire all of us to rejoice in the liberty that now is ours while we labor without ceasing for the second emancipation of the race—the liberation of fettered minds.

"Rejoice and give thanks, O Ethiopia, though the way at times be drear, and the government sworn to justice falls short of its pledges every year.

"Rejoice, for all wrongs shall be righted, and a man, though black he be, will be measured for the worth of his service, for his soul and mental-ity."
