

GLEE CLUB IS WELL RECEIVED**Varied Program Is Given by University Men in First Concert.**

A large audience greeted the Glee and Mandolin Clubs last night upon their first appearance of the season in the concert at the University Auditorium.

The showing made by the club under the direction of Dr. Chester L. Murray as compared with that of clubs of former years was favorable, especially upon consideration of the fact that it was the first concert of the season, while the home concerts in the last two or three years have been given after the return of the club from its annual concert trip.

Selections varying from the semi-classical to the humorous negro dialect songs were given by both the Glee Club and the quartet. "The Song of Prince Rupert's Men" and "De Coppah Moon" by the Glee Club were among the best numbers, and the "Longshoremen," by Arthur Langmeier, accompanied by the club, was well received and applauded. "Just Awearin' for You," by the quartet, consisting of G. E. Martin, E. W. Henderson, D. F. Gray and D. F. Banks, brought applause from the audience that was answered by three encores.

Diversion from the musical side of the program was furnished by Paul Barnes. This part of the entertainment consisted of a Scotch dance followed by a Russian peasant dance as an encore.

The Mandolin Club received the most applause with the popular selections in which the pianist, W. E. McCown, featured.

PROF. F. M. TISDEL TO LECTURE**Literature as a Profession Today.****Subject of Assembly Program.**

The next Assembly lecture, to be held at 7:30 o'clock tomorrow evening, in the University Auditorium, will be given by Prof. F. M. Tisdell on "Literature as a Profession Today." The state of the literary market will be discussed on the basis of information derived from publishers and authors, to determine whether or not the profession is financially attractive to men of literary interest and ability. Considerations of a more professional character will also be considered. To what extent can literary men be trained in the schools and what should be the nature of the training? To what extent does the college of liberal arts in its opportunities and its aims meet the problem? The significance of the new literary movements, particularly in poetry and the drama, will be touched upon and the general influence of the reading public upon the profession discussed. Is a discriminating reading public necessary to the success of the profession and are there any signs that the public taste in literary matters is really improving? The lecture will interest not only prospective authors but all who cultivate the art of reading and therefore desire to see the profession of literature advanced.
