Emergency Workers Expect to Cover Every County in State. Fifteen emergency workers will leave today for the purpose of giving canning demonstrations over the state. They expect to cover every county. Demonstrations will be given at the central points and about three days will be spent in each county. Until the appropriation is available local women will be asked to take charge. A much larger force will be put into the field, and in addition to canning work other methods of preservation will be discussed.

Today and tomorrow a conference for the emergency workers will be held at Schweitzer Hall.
