HOME GUARD SUPPLIES SHORT

Attorney General Reports There Will Be Plenty in Short Time.

Efforts to get equipment at once for a Columbia Home Guard company will meet with delay, according to word just received by Governor Gardner from Attorney General Frank H. McAllister, who was dispatched to Washington to confer with the War Department authorities on arming and equipping the Home Guards. Attorney General McAllister reports that only a limited amount of equipment is available at this time, but there will be plenty in two or three months. His telegram to Governor Gardner follows:

"Have had satisfactory interview with Secretary Baker and afterwards with ordnance officer. Immediate supply of equipment quite limited, but plenty available in two or three months. Will get statement Friday or Saturday on what we can get. Please wire care Capital Park Hotel in formation from Superintendent Lamkin as to rifles now in schools in Missouri." State Superintendent of Schools Uel W. Lamkin informed the Governor that his office has no record of the rifles that have been issued by the Federal Government to military academies and institutions.

A dispatch from Jefferson City says: "Military equipment is known to be used at the State University, where there are probably a thousand new rifles supplied by the Government for use of the University Cadet Corps, which is to be converted into a home guard battalion, at Wentworth Military Academy, at Lexington; Missouri Military Academy at Mexico; and Kemper Military Academy at Boonville."

M. U. MAN WRITES FROM FRANCE

Albert Cowan, in Field Service There, Tells Experiences.

R. W. Cowan of Marshall, Mo., received the following letter from his son, Albert, who is in the American field service in France and who was a student in the College of Agriculture last winter:

"After leaving the ship 'Rochambeau' we marched through the streets of Bordeaux, where everybody greeted us as 'Teddies.' We left Bordeaux at 10:30 o'clock and arrived at Paris the next morning. The boys, about 180 of them, received orders Thursday that they were to go to camp. The work of signing of papers and getting equipped was all finished by 6 o'clock Saturday. We had very little time to see Paris, so got a taxi and rode around for a while.

"The unit is only a short distance from the firing line, but we have not seen any fighting yet. "The unit is under a first lieutenant, the finest mechanic to be procured in France. The French manual of arms is used. The car in service is a 5-ton Pierce-Arrow. It will be two weeks before the unit gets into shape to go into actual service. After three months' service they will

be allowed a seven days' furlough, when there will be a chance to rest and see something of the country.

"The boys are in fine spirits. While off duty a barber shop has been established. My practice in shearing the Missouri mule stands me in good stead now and I find myself an expert in preparing the boys' heads to resist the heat and dust."

M. U. LAND ONCE 33,000 ACRES

Land Near Kansas City Granted by Congress Worth Millions.

Thirty-three thousand acres of what is now Jackson County formed a part of the two townships originally set aside by Congress for the University of Missouri. Almost 8,000 acres—7,612 to be exact—were within the present limits of Kansas City. All this land, now worth 70 or 80 million dollars, was sold by the state in 1831 for \$70,000.

Forty other universities and colleges have followed the example of the University of Missouri and have founded schools or departments of journalism.
