**Measure in Indiana Unconstitutional Says Judge.**

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 17.—Indiana's Woman Suffrage law was today declared unconstitutional and void by Judge Jones of the Marion County Superior Court. Arrangements are being made to appeal it immediately to the Indiana Supreme Court.

**WE EAT TOO MUCH MEAT, SHE ASSERTS**

**Miss Babb Bell Believes the Ignorance About Diet Is Appalling.**

**FISH A SUBSTITUTE**  
**Home Work More Important to the Country Than Knitting, She Says.**

Miss Babb Bell of Columbia, representing the United States Department of Agriculture, has been in Kansas City trying to arrange with the city officials there to engage a "home demonstrator." In an interview there Miss Bell says:

"This matter of the home demonstrator is a patriotic affair. All it needs is backing. We supply the demonstrator; the municipality or an organization finances her. Of course, we prefer municipal backing, having the city and federal governments working together."

In St. Louis a home demonstrator has already started to work, and in St. Joseph funds have been raised to bring one, who will arrive this week. The demonstrator Miss Bell has chosen for Kansas City is Miss Ida Shilling, authorized by the Department of Agriculture as an "Urban Emergency Home Demonstration Agent" and an expert in food problems. She was trained at the University of Missouri under Miss Bell.

The purpose of the home demonstrator is to help solve problems that arise in the home, problems of food, of clothing and of conservation and economy in general. One day a week she will hold office hours to answer questions and settle housewives' difficulties. One day a week she will investigate local conservation conditions, reporting to the department, as part of national conservation survey. The remainder of the week she will be available for demonstrations before women's organizations.

**Women Ignorant on Home Questions.**  
"It's more important than knitting," Miss Bell said. "Not one woman in a hundred knows what a salory is. Not one in a thousand can prepare a balanced meal, with just enough food in it to support a man or woman."

"Most persons think that conservation is not leaving things on your plate. That is nonsense. Conservation is putting proper things in the proper conservative amounts on the plate before you begin to eat."

"Ignorance about the diet is appalling. We eat too much meat for one thing—too much for our health and too much for our country's good at this time. Meat substitutes may be found, differing according to location and economic environment. Fish, I should say, offhand, is a meat substitute which probably needs pushing and would be successful economically in Kansas City. New foodstuffs containing much nutriment, such as cottonseed and peanut meal, should be introduced."
