

SENATE IS URGED TO OUST LA FOLLETTE

Communication from Minnesota Asks for Member's Expulsion.

COMMITTEE CONFERS

Further Action Awaits Decision of Leaders—Accused Is Absent.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—A communication from the governor of Minnesota and the State Public Safety Commission, requesting the expulsion from the Senate of Senator La Follette of Wisconsin, was presented in the Senate today by Senator Kellogg of Minnesota and referred by Vice-President Marshall to the Privilege and Election Committee.

Senator Kellogg received the communication, which was adopted by the State commission as a result of Senator La Follette's recent speech at St. Paul. Before presenting it to the Senate, Kellogg conferred with Vice-President Marshall, Senator Martin of Virginia, Democratic leader, and Senator Pomerene of Ohio, chairman of the committee to which it was referred.

Any further action must first come from the committee. Senator La Follette was not in the chamber when the communication was presented and there was no discussion or other action.

PLANS FOR PAGEANT MADE

Program to Be Given October 6 as Red Cross Benefit.

At 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, October 6, the West Campus of the University will be the scene of one of the most elaborate pageants ever presented here, when the Red Cross workers in the University and city will present nine episodes emphasizing various epochs in history from the time of the rule of tyranny and force, and the struggle of the Greeks against the Persians to the present time as is evidenced in the spread of democracy. Episode 1—"The Rule of Tyranny and Force," Mrs. C. C. Bowling and Prof. Chester Murray.

Episode 2—"The Struggle of the Greeks against the Persians," Mrs. Walter Miller.

Episode 3—"The Gifts of the Romans to Keep Rome Free," Mrs. E. K. Parsons.

Episode 4—"A Legend of Swiss Hatred of Tyranny," Mrs. Marion Hertig and M. Watkins.

Episode 5—"Joan of Arc," (a) The Vision at the Fairy Tree; (b) Joan's Proof of her Commission; (c) Joan's Hour of Trial—Misses Helen Robnett and Margaret West and M. E. Votaw.

Episode 6—"Singing of the Magna Charta," Mrs. Herbert Sill.

Episode 7—"America Honors Washington and LaFayette," Mrs. J. E. Thornton, Mrs. L. W. Dumas and Miss Bessie Thompson.

Episode 8—"The Spread of Democracy," Linwood Taft.

Episode 9—"The Peril of Liberty and the Marshaling of Her Hosts," Misses Louise Nardin, Ella Dobbs, Catherine King, Mrs. C. W. Greene, Mrs. T. A. Hogan and Tudor Lanus.

Well-known people of the University and city will carry parts in the pageant. Students from both Christian and Stephens colleges, high school boys and girls and numerous children are also included in the cast.

By special arrangement the football game between Missouri and William Jewell College has been postponed one-half hour to allow for the presentation of the pageant before the game starts.

10,000 DELEGATES EXPECTED

Disciples of Christ Will Meet in Kansas City October 24-31.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 29.—Ten thousand delegates representing churches of the Disciples of Christ, it is expected, will attend the general convention of the denomination which will be held here October 24 to 31.

The great aim of the Disciples of Christ, according to leaders, is to bring about a unification of all Christian denominations, and this year delegates from other religious bodies will attend the convention to discuss ways and means of extending the unification movement. Among those from other denominations who will attend the convention and make addresses are: Bishop Charles P. Anderson of the Episcopal diocese of Chicago; the Rev. S. H. Woodrow, St. Louis; Henry M. Beardsley, Kansas City, and the Rev. Charles M. Sheldon, Topeka, representing the Congregational Church; the Rev. Robert E. Spier, New York, president of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, and a delegation of laymen and clergy, which was appointed at the Presbyterian General Assembly at Dallas last May.

The church of the Disciples of Christ, also known as the Christian Church, has a membership estimated at 1,500,000. It draws its members principally from Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Illinois, Iowa, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas, North Carolina, Georgia, Colorado, Washington and California.
