Tigers Will Leave For Ames Tonight.

The University of Missouri football team will leave at 8:20 o'clock tonight over the Wabash railroad for Ames, Ia., where it will play the Iowa State Agricultural team Saturday. The team has shown a marked improvement this week and will be in fairly good shape. Coach Schulte is expecting a hard battle and is taking twenty-three men in order to have plenty of available substitutes in case any of the first string men are injured.

Rider has been used in scrimmage this week and while his leg is not well it is much better than a week ago. He will start the game if his leg continues to improve during the next two days. Viner and Kolb have been injured in scrimmage practice but both are expected to be in shape to play Saturday. McClane, the Tiger drop-kicker, is still laid up with a bad knee

and will be unable to play for another week. Urie has been working out the last two days and may be used against Ames. Iowa Aggies May Spring Some Surprise.

In review of conditions on the various gridirons in the Missouri Valley Conference the Associated Press says of the Iowa Aggie team: "The Ames, team after taking a brace earlier in the season, seems to have relapsed slightly. Coach Williams' aggregation has been strangely quiet which may be a sign that the Iowa leader is biding his time rounding his team up and knocking off the rough spots for the Missouri game that will spring some surprises." Yesterday's practice on Rollins Field was light. Slusher and Urie punted while the rest of the men caught the ball and practiced tackling. The freshmen team was again called into play yesterday, but all the scrimmage was eliminated. All the men did was to call signals and try formations. Coach H. F. Schulte is still hammering at the line. No hole is allowed to pass unnoticed. Among those "on the sick list" now are Viner and McLane. Viner's side was severely bruised in Tuesday's practice and he was not able to play yesterday. McLane is just recovering from an injured leg. Urie is not in the best of condition.

Rolla Team to Play At Camp Funston.

CAMP FUNSTON, Kan., Oct. 18.—Few universities and colleges in the United States will be represented on the gridiron this year with as complete a galaxy of stellar players as will the Camp Funston national army cantonment. Football is the pre-eminent sport of the camp. Every company has its team, every regiment and then there is the "major" team which represents the picked men from the entire roll of officers and privates stationed in the cantonment. The direction of the "major" eleven is in the hands of Dr. Paul Withington, head coach at Wisconsin last year, and divisional directors have charge of the smaller teams.

Games have been scheduled for Camp Funston's Varsity with Illinois, Missouri School of Mines, Colorado College, Oklahoma A and M College, Henry Kendall and tentative arrangements are being made to add the Universities of Kansas and Nebraska to the list for post-season games. For Kansas and Nebraska to meet the Funston Varsity, it will be necessary to obtain permission from the

Missouri Valley conference representatives. At present there is a ruling against post-season games but it is thought that the Valley schools will make an exception of the games with the soldiers.

Secretary Lansing today authorized the statement that it definitely had been decided that there would be a conference and that the United States was considering participation in it with a possibility that it would decide to do so.


Complete Students' Physical Test.
