

NEBRASKA MACHINE CRUSHES THE TIGERS

Cornhuskers Score Almost at Will, Making Many Long Runs.

FINAL SCORE 52 TO 0

Winners Use Second-String Men in Second Half—Last Quarter Scoreless.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 10.—Starting with two touchdowns early in the game, the heavy Nebraska football team defeated the crippled Missouri Tigers, 52 to 0, here this afternoon in the first game between these two schools since 1912. The contest, was close only in the final quarter, when Nebraska used many substitutes. Even these kept the Missourians from scoring. The game was replete with spectacular open-field running, in which the Nebraska interference worked with precision.

Nebraska was celebrating its annual homecoming, and a big crowd saw the game.

A 75-yard run by Cook on a returned punt, resulting in a touchdown for Nebraska, and an end run of 52 yards by Schellenberg, followed by a 16-yard dash by McMahon for another touchdown, were features of the first period. Man kicked goal on the second touchdown. The score at the end of the first quarter was: Nebraska 13, Missouri 0.

Tigers Unable to Check Attack.
The second quarter found the Nebraska machine plowing steadily down the field, the lighter Tigers being unable to hold the Cornhuskers. An end run by Schellenberg netted Nebraska's third touchdown, and three minutes later Dodson cleared Missouri's right end for a 30-yard run and again carried the pigskin over the Missouri goal.

An intercepted Missouri pass gave Nebraska the ball in the middle of the field and Schellenberg broke loose for a 45-yard run on the next play. Two line smashes by McMahon and Schellenberg saw the Cornhuskers plunge to the fifth touchdown.

A series of end runs, tackle plunges and straight line bucks enabled the Cornhuskers to march down the gridiron for their sixth touchdown. Schellenberg carried the ball on the final plunge.

The Tigers sputtered late in the second period. They were rewarded with two first downs, a forward pass, Morris to Collins, netting 12 yards. Nebraska intercepted another Tiger pass and the period ended with Nebraska in possession of the ball on their 30-yard line.

Score: Nebraska 39, Missouri 0.

Second-String Men Used.
In the third period, with the team made up largely of second-string men, Nebraska continued gaining almost at will. Schellenberg returned to the game and started with a 60-yard run, followed by a touchdown. Kellogg failed to kick goal. McMahon scored another touchdown and Kellogg kicked goal.

The fourth period showed the closest contest of the game and the ball see-sawed between the 25-yard lines a large portion of the quarter. Nebraska was using many substitutes, content to hold the Missourians scoreless.

The fourth period was the only one in which Nebraska did not score.

JAYHAWKERS DEFEAT SOONERS

BIG ADVANCE SEAT SALE

Large Crowd Expected for Missouri-Kansas Game.

An advance seat reservation for the Kansas-Missouri game that compares favorably with that of 1915 and may even go higher than the figure at that time was indicated yesterday when the envelopes of applications for seats were opened at Rothwell Gymnasium. At all of the other football games here this year there has been noted a falling off of 40 per cent of the sales of last year.

"We had prepared," said J. B. Gib-

son, assistant to Director Meanwell, who is handling the Kansas game ticket sale, "for a big falling off, just like we have had at all the other games this year. But the applications already in are as good if not better than they were at the same time two years ago, and right now it looks like we will have a capacity crowd."

Hundreds of applications have been received from former Missourians now at army camps, among them almost all of the old Missourians at Fort Sheridan, and many from Fort Sill and Camp Funston. Fort Sheridan closes November 26 and this will give numerous old Tiger stars and rooters an opportunity to return for the big Tiger homecoming. Reservations from Harrisonville, Captain Paul Hamilton's home town, Marshall and Kirksville, which will be here for a football game in the morning, and other towns in the state have all helped swell the big basket of applications. Fraternities have also engaged more tickets than usual, one fraternity alone, the Sigma Chi having purchased a block of sixty-four box seats.

Mr. Gibson said yesterday that it would be impossible to say today just how many advance applications had been received but indicated that Athletic Director W. E. Meanwell would make an announcement regarding the advance seat sale on Monday, when the first tickets will be distributed. Out of town orders are now being filled, in the order received.

FRESHMEN DEFEAT CADETS

Team From Mexico Academy Loses in Scrimmage, 53 to 7.

Major Strock of the Missouri Military Academy of Mexico brought his football team to Columbia yesterday to scrimmage with Coach Miller's freshmen.

Only once did the visitors get away, a long forward pass and a long run netting 70 yards for a touchdown. The freshmen scored almost at will, having only to punt four times. In the hour's scrimmage the freshmen scored 53 points and the Missouri Military Academy one touchdown for 7 points.

High School Beats Collegians.

In a football game here with the second team of Central College Friday the Columbia High School won by 47 to 6. Stewart, halfback, doing the star work of the game. He made end runs for 45 and 65 yards, scoring two touchdowns. An end run of 35 yards was also made by Montgomery. The Kewpies gained about three times as much ground in rushes as did their opponents.

PICTURE SHOWS HELP FOOD ADMINISTRATION

Missouri Theaters Being Enrolled as Members of State Organization.

FILMS EACH WEEK

Conservation of Supplies to Be Taught by Special Feature Reels.

Missouri's motion picture theaters are enrolling as members of the State Food Administration, having been given this privilege because of their work in food pledge enrollment campaign and the pledging of their services to the United States Food Administration for graphic displays through film and slides of food conservation.

Certificates bearing the name of each theater are being sent to all of the playhouses showing motion pictures and displaying the material of the food administration from the office of Frederick B. Mumford, federal food administrator for Missouri. These are also being sent to theaters in all states by other state administrators, making a mobilization of the entire motion picture industry in the United States as a publicity force for the food administration.

A motion picture division in charge of Arthur S. Friend, an expert motion picture administrator, has been established in Washington by the national food administration and from these headquarters educational films and slides are being supplied to all states. In addition, three of the largest producers of motion pictures in the nation have donated their services to the administration and are releasing weekly films of the conservation and other administration work.

Posters telling that food administration pictures are being shown by the theaters displaying them are also being sent from the office of Administrator Mumford. The direction of the industry in the state in its voluntary service is in charge of A. D. Flintom of Kansas City, motion picture division chairman for the state administration.

The state administration is urging all patrons of motion picture shows in the state to see the conservation pictures and to inquire at their theaters when they are to be shown.
