Former Tigers Will Play In Army-Navy Game at K. C.

Missouri will be represented in the Army-Navy game to be played Saturday at the American Association Baseball Park in Kansas City. Although Anton Stankowski, last year's Missouri quarterback, has just been released from quarantine, he will probably lead the Funston men in their attack on the Naval recruits. John Hudson, who was a substitute on the Varsity for two years, may get in to the game.

The Missouri Valley also will be represented by Fast of Kansas, former Captain Lindsey of Kansas and "Poge" Lewis of Washington.

Conference Meet Ends Cross Country Season.

The Missouri Valley Cross Country Meet in Manhattan, Kan., last Saturday, which was won handily by the Iowa State Agricultural College team, was the concluding event of the season in the conference. The University of Missouri team has taken part in only two meets this fall, the conference contest and the dual meet against the Iowa State College. Missouri was defeated by the Iowa school and, with four teams entered, took third place in the conference run. At Manhattan Banks was the first Missouri man to finish, getting sixth place Flint, cross-country captain, finished seventh.

There were four teams in the meet. Ames finished first with a score of 24 holding the first three positions. Hawthorn of Ames finished first in 26 minutes and 56 seconds. This is 16 seconds behind the Missouri Valley record, which is now held by Rodkey of the University of Kansas. The course was muddy and heavy. The University of Missouri finished second with a score of 49 and the Kansas Aggies fourth with a score of 79.

Missour men finished in the following order: Banks, first; Flint, second; Reeder, third; Riddle, fourth and McGregor, fifth. Blackburn was in the meet but failed to finish. He finished sixth in the Missouri-Ames dual meet at Ames. In this meet Ames finished first, holding the first five positions. In the Kansas-Kansas Aggies dual meet Kansas won by one point.

The Ames team will be one of the

four to enter the big ten meet at Chicago next Saturday.
