TO POOL RAILWAY EQUIPMENT!

Officials in Washington May Adopt Radical Measures.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The plan of pooling the railroad equipment and traffic of the United States was taken up at the conference today between government officials and railroad heads. The officials realize radical measures must be put into effect.

The conference was attended by members of the Railroad War Board, R. S. Lovett, government director of priority transportation, Fuel Administrator Garfield, Food Administrator Hoover, Chairman Hurley of the shipping board and others.

Although the railroads are handling much larger volumes of traffic than ever have been moved before, railroad officials admit that, unless something is done immediately, their lines cannot carry all that is offered.


