Dean F. B. Mumford has just received a list of the prices of grains, compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture, showing the increase over prices three years ago.

Wheat has increased more per bushel than any other grain.

The prices are as follows:

Wheat	.869	2.006
Corn	.665	1.388
Oats	.404	.787
Barley	.642	1.319

The per cent of increase in the price of wheat is 131; corn 109 per cent; oats, 195 per cent; barley, 105 per cent.
