

ESTIMATES THAT 250 MEN WILL REGISTER

Draft Board Bases Figure on Number Who Enrolled a Year Ago.

IN SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Class 1 in Boone County Won't Be Exhausted in 1918, H. S. Jacks Says.

About 250 young men who have attained the age of 21 in the last year will register June 5 at the Boone County Courthouse, the local draft board believes. This estimate is based on the number of that age who were registered last year. The work will be handled in the sheriff's office on the first floor from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. Members of the local board will have charge, assisted by such county officers as are necessary.

About 207 men yet remain in Class 1 in Boone County. There have been 168 men sent to camp and 125 excused to enlist in Army or Navy. Approximately 200 of the new 21-year-old registrants will be physically fit, which will give Boone County 400 men for Class 1.

"I can't figure how soon the class will be exhausted," Harry S. Jacks, clerk of the draft board, said. "Probably not in 1918, however. There are a number of farmers who have been given deferred classification, and these will revert to Class 1 in time, increasing the number still more."

Ten days after registration questionnaires will be sent to the newly enrolled men, and these must be returned in seven days. Consequently, the draft board believes it will have the men placed by July 1.

Fewer University men are expected to register this year, as most of them will have returned to their homes. Three hundred men signed up in Columbia in 1918, and as a result calls are being sent to men in Los Angeles, New York and other distant cities for men to appear. The board is permitting the candidates to transfer their examinations.

BOYS' AND GIRLS' CLUBS GROW

Ten Give Entire Time to Direction and Organization of Groups.

The work of the boys' and girls' clubs in Missouri has grown so rapidly this season that seven men and three women, with headquarters in the Agriculture Building, are giving their entire time to the direction and organization of these groups. More than fifteen thousand boys and girls regularly receive literature from these workers, and in turn send formal reports to the Columbia office of work done in the different projects. In addition to the sewing, canning, corn and pig projects the war garden campaign has been taken up with enthusiasm by girls and boys all over the state.

Miss Gertrude Warren of Washington, D. C., who has charge of the home economics work of the girls' clubs throughout the United States, has just finished a conference with Prof. R. H. Emberson and members of his staff, concerning the sewing and cooking projects with special emphasis on the work of the canning clubs. The ten state workers expect to spend most of the summer visiting clubs in different sections of the state. Miss Olga Hungegate left today for Hannibal, where she will demonstrate canning methods before the clubs of the town, and F. M. Hands is in Jackson County this week giving demonstrations before both canning and garden clubs. Prof. R. H. Emberson, G. W. Reavis and Miss Addie D. Root will go to Jefferson City next Monday to give a series of such demonstrations before the annual state convention of county superintendents.

PRAISES PRESIDENT WILSON

Oxford Professor Embodies Tribute in Speech on "The Idea of This War."

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) LONDON, April 19.—"The object of the war is to carry the spirit of President Wilson into the hearts and minds of the people of Germany," declared Prof. Spenser Wilkinson of Oxford in an address on "The Idea of This War." He said:

"The German Emperor and President Wilson are each of them at the head of a great nation, and each of them wields in that nation supreme authority.

"But the two men stand for two antagonistic systems. The German emperor is never tired of proclaiming that he has received a special commission from God Almighty to educate and instruct the German people and other peoples, after his armies shall have crushed them.

"Mr. Wilson, on the other hand, was chosen by the people of the United States to preside over their government. He has no commission to educate them. Their idea is to be allowed to grow and to develop their powers by doing their work. Here is Mr. Wilson's conception of his mission:

"I feel nothing so much as the intensity of the common man. I can pick out in every audience the men who are at ease in their fortunes. But there are in every crowd other men who are listening to hear somebody speak the thing that is stirring in their hearts and minds. It makes a man's heart ache to think that he cannot be sure he is doing it for them—to wonder whether they are longing for something he does not understand. He prays God that something will

bring into his conscience what is in theirs, so that the whole nation may feel at least released from its dumbness, feel at last that there is no invisible force holding it back from its goal, feel at last that there is hope and confidence, and that the road may be trodden as if they were brothers, shoulder to shoulder, not asking each other anything about differences of class, not contesting for any selfish advance, but united in the common enterprise."

"The object of this war is to carry the spirit of those words into the hearts and minds of the German people. Is that not an object worth living for and dying for?"
