business—it is the influenza. A house wife is more likely to come uptown to shop if she is sure that she will not be thrown into contact with a large group of customers.

The Attitude of Business Men.

C. O. Selders, chairman of the committee of business men, said:

"Business is no doubt suffering. Yet if it were in my power to lift the ban I don't know that I would do it. The fear of influenza does keep people from town. It seems to me if the children were not brought, and that if people came only on business and not to visit, it would make a lot of difference. I believe that if people know they are protected by a quarantine they would sooner come than if they know they are not."

J. P. Hertzler remarked that the committee of business men did not come to dictate to the Board of Health but that they came to confer with them to see if they could not help out and to give suggestions that would lighten the business restrictions and yet not be of any danger. He said that they came to present the business man's viewpoint, the Board of Health could not know that as well as they.

"We wanted to meet to suggest something and to have something suggested to us," he said. "We have not an antagonistic view. We do not wish to impair health."

Mr. Hertzler suggested that the business men would be glad to help supply more adequate hospital facilities to help stamp out the disease. By quarantining those members of the family who have the influenza in a hospital, for which he said one of the barracks might be used, the disease might be kept down, since it is direct contact that causes its spread.

A. J. Estes said that the one thing that had aroused the business men was the six-to-a-store regulation. The larger stores felt an imposition. "However," he said, "the business men came not to dictate but to confer. They only wish to see what can be done with the help of the Board of Health. It is important that the customers act quickly and get out of the store. If we do not allow customers to stay too long, if we keep our stores well ventilated and fumigated, if the children were eliminated and the one interested in the shopping comes alone, I believe we could have more than six customers at one time in the larger stores."

He said that the object of the meeting was to get harmony and co-operation among the business men.


