SPORT

When Bob Simpson sails for France June 9 to take part in the A.E.F. track and field meet to be held in Pershing Stadium at Joinville le Pont, near Paris, June 22 to July 6, he may be accompanied by several other University of Missouri athletes, Coach H. F. Schulte said this morning.

Captain Sylvester, C. H. ("Chuck") Lewis and Bahlman Parker are the three men that the coach is backing strongest to accompany Missouri's premier hurdler to the big army meet.

Jack Scholz and Jack Barlow will not be eligible, as both are former navy men, and only army men will be permitted to participate in the A. E. F. meet. The men recommended by Schulte are discharged S.A.T.C. men.

Schulte's recommendation was made in response to a letter from F. C. Rubien, secretary of the A. A. U., asking for a list of Missouri track men of championship caliber. They will tryout for the team of fifty men which will go overseas at the Western Conference Meet at Chicago June 7. Those who make good will board the train that night for New York, and sail the following Monday. All three men selected by Schulte have signified their willingness to make the trip.

Sylvester, who is running the hurdles in the same class with Simpson and the Loomis brothers of Chicago, will tryout for the sticks, and according to Schulte, stands a strong chance of being chosen to go overseas. The Tiger captain has already demonstrated his ability as one of the best hurdle men in college circles.

Lewis, Missouri's all-round star, and high point man for the Tigers this year, will be slated for the pentathlon. He placed third in that event at the Penn games and has few challengers in the west.

Bahlman Parker, Schulte's third protege, is a very consistent middle distance man, and is down to do the

quarter in 50 flat, and the half in 2 minutes flat.

Schulte yesterday expressed some disappointment over the ruling which bars Scholz and Barlow. Barlow is a good quarter-mile man, and Scholz is one of the best sprint men in the world. He has done the century in world's record time and is as consistent a low second man as there is in the country. Both men, however, will be eligible for the Olympic Games at Antwerp next year, and Schulte is planning to send his former sailors overseas then.

Simpson's sailing for France next month will mark the beginning of his second trip overseas to run the hurdles. He competed in the stick events in the Olympiad at Stockholm in 1916.

Three Six-Footers In Unique Meet.

Coach H. F. Schulte has arranged a unique pentathlon for the three six-footers on his track squad for next Saturday. Godwin, Barker and Moore will compete in the century dash, 110-low hurdles, high jump, broad jump, and shot put. Schulte has selected events in which no one of these three men are above the average, and will make no predictions as to the possible winner.

CONSUL PRAISES U. S. POLICY

Brazilian Here in Journalism Week, Pays Tribute to America.

Sebastiano Sampaio, Brazilian consul at St. Louis and a visitor at the University during Journalism Week, has printed an article eulogizing the United States in the Jornal do Commercio, according to a dispatch from Rio Janeiro. This article by the widely known Brazilian journalist is in answer to the bitter attacks of Madeiros de Albuquerque upon the policy of this country.

The dispatch says: "The article, which was written in March, defends the United States policy toward Mexico, praises the 'idealism' of President Wilson and the people of the United States, and gives a glowing account of the development of the United States Army and Navy, dwelling at great length upon the patriotism and sacrifices of the people in providing food, money and troops in the effort to win the war."

New Traffic Ordinance Unsigned. Mayor James Gordon has not yet signed the traffic ordinance passed by the City Council at the meeting Tues-

day night. One section of the ordinance, which provides that Hitt be a one-way street from Broadway to Cherry, probably is the cause of the mayor's delay in signing. It provides that vehicles can go south, only, on that section of Hitt street.

tification of army cemeteries in France, the British War Graves Commission will have three experimental cemeteries on view this summer so that the public may judge the advantages of the adopted scheme.


