

# FRATERNITY PLEDGES WILL BE INITIATED

## Hard Work Has Its Reward For Freshmen Who Made Good.

# HORSEPLAY ABSENT Pan-Hellenic Ruling Confines Initiation to Local Houses.

Hard work has its rewards, and those freshmen who made their grades the last term are now being initiated, or will be in the near future. A ruling in the men's Pan-Hellenic Council allows fraternities to initiate all freshmen who make at least fifteen-sixteenths of the hours they are carrying, providing that they are carrying as many as fifteen hours a week. The ruling concerning initiations into sororities is more severe. It requires that each pledge must have an average of "M" in all of her work.

This year has been conspicuous by the absence of horse play on the campus. A Pan-Hellenic ruling passed during the latter part of last year forbids fraternities to carry any part of their initiation outside of the fraternity houses. In previous years freshmen could be seen at this time of the year riding to school on wooden horses wearing white trousers, barking or sitting down wherever they happened to be in response to a sophomore's whistle.

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## RADICALS SHOULD BE DEPORTED

At Least That is What Winners of An Athenaeum Debate Say.

That radicals should be deported was the subject of a Saturday night debate by the Athenaeum Debating Society. The judges decided in favor of the argument that reds should continue to be deported. Corwin D. Edwards and John Casky, Jr., talked for the affirmative and James Coppedge and Terrance Clark spoke for the negative. John L. Gaylord, Clare Magee and Paul S. Limerick were the judges. The M. S. U. Debating Society heard arguments for and against Missouri's having a legislature composed of one

house rather than the bicameral system. The judges decided for those who argued for one-chamber plan. C. F. Burch and A. N. Brown supported the affirmative. Stanley Andrews and Lawrence W. DeMuth argued for the negative.
