GENERALS' LIVES PARALLEL

Experiences of Pershing and Crowder, Coming Here Soon, Similar.

"Lives of great men oft remind us" that the boys who didn't like to study and played hooky, were expelled from college or otherwise discredited in their youth turn out to be the pride of their home towns and revered as geniuses. The lives of two great men seldom run such parallels as those of Gen. John J. Pershing and Gen. Enoch Crowder, both of whom will receive LL.D.'s from the University of Missouri in April.

Both Crowder and Pershing were born in Missouri and within a year of each other—1859 and 1860 respectively. Both were appointed to West Point and on graduation became lieutenants in the United States army. Both went to the Dakotas to serve during the Indian uprisings. Both were commandants of training camps at state universities: Crowder at the University of Missouri and Pershing at the University of Nebraska. Both received LL.B. degrees from the universities where they were commandants.

Pershing served in the Philippine Islands campaign and Crowder also from 1898 to 1901. Both were sent as United States observers to the Russo-Japan War. Pershing was with Kuroki's army in Manchuria in 1915. Crowder was in Manchuria with the Japanese from 1904 to 1905.

Crowder perfected the selective draft system, getting the men of the A.E.F. ready to go overseas. Pershing took them across and commanded the A.E.F. in France. Both will be in Columbia for commencement, April 24.
