Tigers Again Snowed Under by Aggies.

MANHATTAN, Kan., April 28.—The failure of the Tiger offensive to function at the proper time was responsible for another defeat for Miller's clan here this afternoon in the opening game of Missouri's invasion of Kansas; the Aggies winning by a 6-2 count. It was the third defeat of the conference season for Missouri and

the third trouncing at the hands of the Kansas Aggies.
Stanley McLane was again the victim of trying circumstances. As was the case in the second game at Columbia last week, the Tigers totaled more hits than the victors. Miller's men pounded out twelve hits as against the Aggies' nine, and of the twelve but two figured in the scoring.
Sam Canterbury was Missouri's leading actor. The Tiger third sacker proved himself worthy of the recently acquired position of captain, by pounding out a home run, triple and single, and playing a clever game in the field. Canterbury was responsible for both of the Missouri counters.
McLane sailed along in fair shape until the seventh inning when a pair of hits and a couple of bobbles got him in hot water and Miller withdrew him in favor of Carter who finished the game. McGrath went to full distance for the Aggies although the Tigers pounded him regularly.
The same teams will play again today, Tuesday's game having been postponed. Otto and Roberts are slated to hurl for the Aggies and Tigers respectively. The Tigers will move on to Lawrence tomorrow where they will open a two game series in the camp of the Jayhawker.

Olympic Games Are Open in Belgium.

ANTWERP, Belgium, April 28.—Belgium is again the scene tomorrow of a world-wide conflict.
Athletic armies of the world's greatest powers will compete in the battle of speed, strength and endurance which runs through the summer to September 12.
The Olympic games, premier sporting events of the world since the days of the ancient Greeks, come back to the spotlight after a lapse of eight years.
The last Olympic games were held in Stockholm in 1912. Berlin was to have been the scene of the 1916 encounter but all Europe was wrapped in battle at that time. Germany, Austria and the other nations of the Central Powers were denied admission to the games.
The hockey games in the Antwerp Ice Palace opened the Olympic contests. The surface of artificial ice is 175 by 60 feet. Accommodations will be provided for more than 5,000 spectators. The original plans of holding the games on the Brussels canal were changed recently.
After the hockey and figure skating contests, yachting comes next on the program for July 7 to 10. Polo follows from July 15 to August 2; rifle and pistol shooting July 24-31; and cycling August 9-12.
The real ceremonies are to come on August 14 when the track and field games are to start following the opening of the stadium. The king and queen are to be present, with their court attendants and promi-


