Missouri Fourth at Western Conference.

Illinois won the twentieth annual track and field meet of the Western Conference at Ann Arbor, Mich., Saturday with 40 points, placing in second of the sixteen events. Michigan placed second with 30 points, followed by Wisconsin, with 25 1/2 and Missouri, with 14 1/2.

Jack Scholz, who was the individual star of the meet, won the 100-yard dash in 19 seconds and the 220 in 21 1/2, tying the conference record. Massengale finished second in the 220. George Williams tied for fourth place in the high jump, which went to six feet, and the Tiger relay team placed fourth in the mile relay, which was won by Illinois in 3:21 1/2, which ties the conference record in this event.


M. U. STUDENTS MARRY
