Negro Fined for Taking \$20. From Phi Gamma Delta Member. Ed Rogers, a negro, was fined \$18.25 in the police court this morning by Judge M. L. Edwards for stealing a twenty dollar gold coin belonging to W. S. Hocker from the drawer of a dresser in a room of the Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity House, 514 College avenue.

According to Hocker, Rogers was employed by the fraternity to do some cleaning last Tuesday. At noon when the members were absent from the house the negro ransacked the dresser drawers and obtained the gold piece. The coin was a keepsake of his. He notified the local banks to inform him if anyone turned in a

twenty-dollar gold coin bearing the date 1878. Yesterday noon Rogers had the coin changed at the Central Bank. "Where did you get it," asked the cashier of the bank. "I've had it for three years," the negro said. "I was working at a packing plant and they always paid off in gold." Mr. Hocker identified the coin.
