

ACCIDENT AT ROLINS FIELD HURTS DOCTOR

Dr. J. E. Jordan Knocked Unconscious by Automobile After Football Game Last Saturday.

HEAVY TRAFFIC AT GATE

Bruised and Cut About Body, With Probable Internal Injuries—Has Not Recovered Consciousness.

Dr. J. E. Jordan, 1401 Anthony street, was seriously injured and rendered unconscious as the result of an automobile accident Saturday afternoon near Rollins field.

The accident happened just after the football game. Dr. Jordan was crossing the street to his own car and had not seen the signal of the traffic officer.

An automobile, owned by Mrs. R. J. Booth, 114 Hitt street, struck Dr. Jordan just before he reached the curb. He was knocked down and sustained a scalp wound and one leg was badly bruised.

Dr. Jordan was unconscious from the time of the accident, about 4:45 o'clock, until about 6 o'clock. He regained consciousness for a few minutes.

PRESIDENT HILL TO SPEAK

William Jewell Will Inaugurate New Head Friday.

Dr. David J. Evans will be formally inaugurated the sixth president of William Jewell college, Friday, says a dispatch from Liberty, Mo. The principal speaker will be President A. Ross Hill of the University of Missouri.

Dr. Evans, the first alumnus to be elected president of the school, first entered William Jewell as a student, January 1, 1895, and became president just twenty-five years to a day, January 1, 1920.

He was a farm boy until he preached his first sermon in 1894 in Livingston County, Mo., and entered college the next year. He was graduated in 1900. He received his doctorate degree from the Baptist Theological Seminary in 1905.

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ANTI-REDS RIP, BIG HOLES IN SOVIET ARMIES

42,000 Prisoners and Much Spoils Seized by Poles in Last Drive—Russia in State of Turmoil.

STRIKES CREATE CHAOS
