SOONERS HAVE A BIG TEAM

A glance at the Sooner line-up, with the weights and number of years played on the team, shows a strong aggregation that outweighs the Tigers. In the line there is Hamm, weighing 195 pounds with two years' varsity experience, playing center. Deacon, the right guard is playing his third year and tips the scales at 210 pounds. McKinley, handling the other guard position is a 190-pound man with two years' experience. Smoot, 215 pounds, with three years on the team is considered Oklahoma's star lineman. Johnson, 189 pounds, is playing his second season. At the ends, Captain Luster, 155, has three years' experience and Tyler, 170 pounds, has an equal number of years to his credit.

In the backfield, Davis, a second-year man weighs 170 pounds. Swateck and White handle the halves positions. Both have had two years' experience and weigh 168 and 180 pounds, respectively. Morrison, 170 pounds, is playing his first year on the team at fullback.

A couple of substitutes, Ogilvie and Hill, are counted on by the Sooners to add great strength to the backfield. In the Sooner-Piker game Hill was sent in as a substitute and distinguished himself by tearing holes in the Piker line, breaking up forward passes and using the aerial route for long gains.

basketball squad is being organized. E. L. Edwards is captain of the football eleven.

The Jefferson School team practices on the field of the Columbia High School. Because this field has only recently been completed the grade school team has been unable to practice. With a bunch of husky youngsters they expect to make a showing in ward school football when the team is better organized. Floyd White is captain of the team. The school also has a girl's basketball team.

Orval Turner is captain of the Eugene Field School eleven. The team was recently defeated by the Lee School by score of 18 to 0. This school has also been handicapped because of lack of equipment.

Charles Turner is captain of the team at the Grant School. The pupils show considerable enthusiasm for athletics. The football team was defeated by the Lee School with a score of 26 to 0. Both the Grant and Field schools have basketball teams.

Football games may be negotiated by the players themselves but they must have the approval of the principal of each school before they can be played. The games are usually arranged a day before they are played, in order to receive the approval of the teachers and that the parents may be notified.

"I am ashamed that ward school athletics haven't received more encouragement," said W. I. Oliver, city superintendent of schools. "We had planned to organize a regular schedule and provide coaches for the students, but other business has been so pressing that we have been unable to carry out the plans. Probably by spring we will be able to work out a baseball schedule."

"It is surprising how eager the students are to take part in the field games," said the principal of the Jefferson School. "Raised as they are in a University town, they have an excellent knowledge of football. Games are usually held on Saturdays. Because of lack of facilities a few games have been played at the fairgrounds.

Coaches have not been provided because of a lack of funds. Students from Christian and Stephens colleges have volunteered to coach the girls in the schools for credit in practice teaching. At times in the past men from the University have volunteered to coach the football team but no such arrangement has been made for this year. Temporarily at least the only means of providing coaches seems to be by this method.

The mothers of the Lee School are putting a plan into operation that has had considerable effect on the athletics of that school. The organization is helping to raise money to bear the necessary expenses and giving every encouragement possible to the participants in the school teams.

WARD SCHOOL ATHLETES ARE BUSY THIS FALL

While all eyes are turned on the Tigers as they go marching down the season, there is another football tournament going on, less spectacular but intensely interesting to the participants. It is the ward school athletics of Columbia.

Lee School claims the championship to date and the young captain, Robert Moore, modestly says their goal has never been crossed for a touchdown. Located as it is close to the University, the school seems to have caught the fall craze for athletics. Mrs. Robert I. Simpson has been engaged to coach the girls' basketball team and a coach for the football team has been secured.

Benton School has been less fortunate in its organization of athletics. A basketball and a football were delayed in shipment and not delivered until recently. There are several out for football but as yet no games have been played. A girl's

Allotment of tickets to applicants will take place by drawing Nov. 15. Tickets reserved may be obtained at the gymnasium after that date and up to Nov. 20. All tickets not called for by Nov. 20 will be placed on sale.

Columbia applications need not be accompanied by money for tickets. Out-of-town applicants, however, should inclose self-addressed envelope and 12 cents to cover cost of registering tickets, together with price of tickets ordered.

Activity ticket holders who desire reserved seats must make application for them by Nov. 13. Activity ticket coupons will count as \$2.50 toward reserved or box seat. Tickets in the rooters section will be allotted only to those holding tickets showing they have occupied this section at four other games. Applications for tickets in this section must be made on special form. All bleacher seats will be reserved.

Reservations will be limited to six bleacher seats or one box of eight seats for any one person or organization. There will be no exception to this rule. Applicants asking for more tickets will be allotted only six bleacher or eight box seats.
