

## BREAK GROUND FOR COUNTRY CLUB BUILDING

New Clubhouse to be Complete in Every Detail—Will Be Ready for Occupancy by Next June.

IT WILL COST \$22,000  
Large Dance Floor Provided For—Dining Capacity Elastic With Rooms Serving Dual Purposes.

Work started yesterday on the foundation of the Columbia Country Club house on Hinkson and Moss avenues. The building will be completed by next June. The clubhouse will cost in the neighborhood of \$22,000, exclusive of furnishings, according to H. S. Bill, the architect who is working on the plans. It is to be complete in every detail. The building will consist of two stories, said Mr. Bill. "A sixteen foot porch will extend the length of the club house on the south and east sides, the east porch being especially adapted for use as a dining room. The assembly room, which will be thirty by sixty feet, will be used both as a living room and as a dance hall. An open fireplace at each end of the room, with wooden mantel and brick facings, will add to its attractiveness as a living room, and a finished dancing floor will equip the room for private and club dances. It is expected that the east porch will be the best place for dinners and

luncheons; but in addition to this, two private dining rooms in the west of the assembly room, also being planned, it being so arranged that these rooms may also be used as dining rooms. To the north of the living room, the kitchen, pantries and serving room will be located, which will open into the dining room and on to the east porch.

"The south end of the basement will be used for the rest rooms, one for women and one for men, with a stone fireplace in each. The lockers and shower room will also be situated in the basement.

"The north end of the basement will be fitted up as living quarters for the green keeper and the caretakers of the club house.

"The basement story which will be altogether above ground on the south and east sides, will be made of concrete and stucco. In contrast to this, the upper part of the building will be of white weather boarding, with green shutters at the windows."

### K. U. PLANS A NEW STADIUM

Drive Started to Raise \$1,000,000 by Subscription.

A drive for a \$1,000,000 stadium and a student union building at the University of Kansas was started at Lawrence Monday. According to the present plan subscriptions are to be taken first from the students and later from the alumni. Pledges will be made during the drive in the form of non-interest bearing promissory notes, payable in eight equal semi-monthly installments, the first payment being May 1. The notes do not fall due until at least half a million dollars has been raised. Each student is being asked to pledge a minimum of \$40.

Work will start immediately tearing down the present decrepit bleachers on McCook field and preparing it and Hamilton Field, immediately south of McCook field for building.
